Unionvale—Funeral services were held at the Hopewell United Brethren church for Adam Wesley Hewitt, 81, a life-long resident of this vicinity, who died in Portland Tuesday, September 9. Rev. C. P. Gates of Portland, officiated.

Hewitt was the fourth child in the family of ten children of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hewitt, pioneer residents of the Unionvale district. He was born at Wheatland April 2, 1849, and was married to Miss Cynthia J. Pittman in the summer of 1872. He was a member of the Unionvale Evangelical church and also served many years on the local school board.

Surviving are his widow, one son, Otis W. of Salem; two daughters, Mrs. H. W. Becker and Mrs. Albert C. Stoutenburg, of Portland; and five brothers, Judge Henry H. Hewitt, of Albany; Matthew C. of Roseville, Cal.; Dr. Jasper L. of Portland; H. W. of La Grande, and Dr. L. I. of Portland.

DISABILITY ACTION BROUGHT BY SMITH

Dallas—Ben R. Smith filed a suit Thursday against the state accident commission. He states that on February 21, 1929 he was an employee of the Willamette Valley Lumber company and had been for some time prior to that date. Because of an accident which occurred on the date mentioned he received a permanent disability.

The commission on July 21 issued a 35 per cent permanent partial disability and loss of function of a hand. On July 31, plaintiff filed a petition seeking a rehearing and also asking for a 75 per cent disability allowance. The commission denied the petition and affirmed their previous decision.

Plaintiff now asks for a court order that the claim be referred back to the commission and that they be ordered to fix compensation in accordance with the allegations made, and that they be ordered to pay the amount of compensation fixed by law and in accordance with the verdict rendered by the court plus the costs and disbursements of the suit.
