

VALLEY CITIES TO HOLD VOTE ON CITY JOBS

Independence—Mayor A. L. Thomas has issued a call for a city election to be held October 8 to nominate a city ticket for the general election. A mayor, recorder and three councilmen will be nominated.

The term of mayor is for two years and that of recorder two years and councilmen four years. B. F. Swope is serving as recorder at present, as the duly elected recorder at the last election refused to qualify.

Councilmen Hubbard, Cockle and Walker are the retiring officers this year. Cockle was elected two years ago to fill a vacancy.

Silverton—At the election November 4, city voters will elect a mayor, treasurer, recorder and three councilmen to serve four years and the others two years each.

HUBBARD RATES ON ELECTRICITY ARE STILL HIGH

Hubbard—That the rate reduction of electricity which went into effect September 1 is a little benefit to the majority of light and power users in this district was the consensus of opinion of the budget committee the council and the other property holders present at the Friday night meeting of the city council.

After the general discussion the recorder was instructed to communicate with the public service commission to ascertain whether the Hubbard rates correspond with the rates in Portland and Salem. Hubbard is supplied with electricity by the Molalla Electric company with headquarters at Aurora.

Other matters of interest discussed was the city liens against property holders who had not paid for street improvements of various types. It was brought out that such liens might be terminated at the end of 90 days by the city and the property offered for sale. Some unpaid water user bills were ordered paid or water would be shut off.

City protection was discussed. While the marshal, Carl Ohme, was regularly elected as such, Charles Moore was appointed special police at call for emergencies and night work.

The budget was presented and was accepted by the council. The committee was composed of L. M. Scholl, Will Barrett, E. B. Gause, H. C. Mack and Carl Ohme, the same as last year and considerably lower than some years ago due to the fact that the water plant is now self paying.

Councilmen present were L. A. Beckman, Baine Paulsen, George Grimes, Jerome Jackson and August Will. Property owners, Charles Moore and C. M. de Lespinasse. The meeting was presided over by Mayor Garfield Voigt with E. O. Erickson, recorder at the desk.
