

YODER TAKES OWN LIFE BY SHOTGUN USE

Woodburn—Harvey M. Yoder, 43, committed suicide Tuesday afternoon by shooting himself with a shotgun at the home of his father, Daniel Yoder, east of Hubbard near Hopewell.

Yoder had been in poor health for several months and his mind was affected by his condition. He leaves a wife and five children in Portland, three brothers, Clyde of Woodburn, Willis and Raymond of Canby, seven sisters, Mrs. Laura Ramage of Portland, Mrs. Rose Fox of Portland, Mrs. Wilma Jones of Woodburn, Mrs. Grace Yoder of Hubbard, Mrs. Minnie Bonney of Aurora, Mrs. Clara Burkholder of Aurora, and Mrs. Janie Prevost of Portland and his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Yoder. Funeral arrangements have not been made.

CONTEST SEEN AFTER BALLOT ON DISTRICTS

Albany, Ore.—Following the adverse vote of Shedd union high school district of Saturday on the proposal to change its boundaries to exclude portions of Belle Plain district 60 and Morgan district 29, residents of Belle Plain district were preparing to contest the election Tuesday and, that failing, to contest the various steps by which the district was formed.

The vote on the district boundary change was 38 yes, and 39 no. If the vote stands and the formation of the district is upheld, children of district 60, who have been attending Albany high school, will be required to attend the Shedd Union high school, unless their parents pay their tuition to the Albany district and transportation charges.

Saturday's adverse vote will require the sponsors of Brownville union high school district to initiate a new petition against Shedd.

The union high school problem in several sections of Lin county has been a live issue with a number of districts during the past few months and has caused much discussion.
