DOCTOR KILLS WAR VETERAN

Carthage, Mo. (AP)—Barnard Grinder, 33, of Washington, D. C., a veteran and nurse, died in a hospital here Sunday night from a bullet wound inflicted by Dr. W. B. Chapman, prominent Carthage physician, who believed Grinder was attempting a holdup.

Grinder went to the Chapman private hospital late Sunday night and tried to sell a watch to a nurse. The nurse called Dr. Chapman, who appeared with a gun.

Grinder and his wife were stranded here enroute to Phoenix, Arizona, because of the wrecking of their motor car Saturday. Grinder was trying to sell the watch to raise money to pay for repairs to the car. Dr. Chapman surrendered to officers Monday morning and was released after he explained the fatal shot was fired in a scuffle over possession of the weapon. An inquest will be held Monday night.

TROOPS GUARD NEGRO SLAYERS

Jefferson City, Mo. (AP)—Three companies of the Missouri national guard Monday were ordered to St. Genevieve county by Governor Caulfield as a precautionary measure against possible rioting as a result of the killing there early Sunday of Harry Panchot and wounding of Paul A. Ritter by three negroes. The troops were requested by Sheriff L. J. Zeigler.

The troops, numbering 130, were ordered mobilized in Festus, DeSoto and Cape Garard counties Monday morning but their movement was kept secret until after they had reached St. Genevieve county Monday afternoon. Adjutant General A. V. Adams went to the scene to take charge of national guard activities.

Sheriff Zeigler in a telephone conversation with the governor indicated he feared an outbreak against other negroes in the county as reprisals for the brutal shooting of Panchot and Ritter.

Country Not Hurt by Panic

New Orleans (AP)—Twobridge Gallows, of New York, president of the Investment Bankers Association of America, told the association's members in convention Monday business does not need artificial respiration, as the wealth-producing power of the country has not been hurt essentially.

President Gallows' address treated with the general conditions and circumstances affecting national investment banking, and resounded with optimism regarding the country's business and financial future.

"The orgy of speculation which clouded the country's vision has passed," he said, "and clearer thinking is now the rule rather than the exception. Old fashioned standards for judging values are again back in vogue, and as investment bankers, we can do our part to direct the savings of the country into constructive and dependable lines."

"While speculation has its proper and independent function in our economic life, after all, the back log of prosperity is the savings and sound investments of the people. Through constructive financing and prudent saving, there has been built up a renewed buying power and normal demand for goods and services. With your help, normal confidence can be more readily restored and the fundamental law of supply and demand brought into balance."

Carson To Speak To Breakfast Club

Speaking for Senator Ed Bailey, democratic candidate for governor, Joseph K. Carson of Portland will address the members of the Breakfast club at their regular weekly meeting at 8 o'clock Tuesday morning, according to word received from Carl Doughan, chairman of the state democratic central committee.

Carson, secretary of the state committee, will fill in for Senator Bailey owing to the inability of the candidate to come to Salem. Bailey's itinerary for this week takes him into eastern Oregon for a series of speeches.

Tricky Hunters Gauge Births for Coyote Bounties

Logan, Utah, (AP)—There's a trick to every trade. It coyote hunting the trick is to gauge correctly the day of the birth of coyote pups.

Logan hunters, with an eye on liberal bounties, are very careful not to kill expectant mother coyotes. Rather do they keep a weather eye on their victims and wait until the litters appear.

Then it's merely a process of digging out. They find there's a considerable difference in being reimbursed for one coyote and six or eight.

FIND GIRL DEAD IN BOXER'S ROOM

Los Angeles, (AP)—Twenty year old Hazel Cole was discovered dead Monday in the same apartment in which Bobby La Salle, local fighter, was lying intoxicated, deputy sheriff reported.

La Salle, known in ring circles as "Bad Boy Bobby" was so drunk that officials were not able to question him, it was said.

The girl's body was found by Neil Murphy whose apartment was the scene of a party at which Miss Cole, La Salle, Miss May Levine, 17, and Murphy were present.

Murphy said he left the apartment to take Miss Levine to her home. When he returned he found Miss Cole dead and La Salle unconscious. Officers said Miss Cole's body was nude.

Murphy told authorities that eight quarts of gin were consumed by the group while they were dining at the beach Sunday night and when they returned to his apartment early Monday morning.

La Salle was not held. Officers took him to his home and said he would be questioned when he became sober.

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Metschan Demands Recapture Clause in Water Power Licenses

Phil Metschan, republican candidate for governor, told the Salem chamber of commerce at noon Monday that the federal scheme of granting licenses for water power development includes protection of the taxpayers to a high degree, but that if elected governor he would go farther than the government for their protection. He said he would demand a recapture clause in all contracts between state and private interests whereby the developed power rights might be taken over by the state without resort to condemnation.

Metschan took an emphatic stand in his address here for free textbooks, protection of women and children in industry, and for old age pensions.

Metschan began his talk by reading the Coolidge sermonette entitled "Sit Tight and Quit Rocking the Boat," and declared that Coolidge had described exactly the situation existing in Oregon.

"We have an independent candidate," he said, "who is surrounded by a group of selfish politicians who have never taken any interest in the upbuilding of the state. They have taken advantage of the situation created by the death of Senator George Joseph and are appealing to the radical element with measures that are preposterous."

Metschan termed the thing that the independent move is working towards as state socialism similar to that tried in North Dakota.

"This same non-partisan movement threatened Oregon a few years ago," he said, "and succeeded in controlling a legislature in the state of Washington. That legislature has gone down as the most corrupt in the history of that state."

Striking at the hydroelectric district utility bill Metschan declared that if it were adopted investment bankers would not buy the proposed utility certificates. "Neither would you buy them," he said. "He compared the measure to the measure under which Oregon irrigation districts were organized, and said that because of the latter 13,000 families in Oregon are now in distress and that some districts have an indebtedness of \$500 an acre."

"Who puts these things through?" he asked. "Why, it is the political business men, the engineers without employment and the men who manufacture the supplies."

Speaking further of power rights developed by private interests, Metschan said that if elected governor he would fight against the corporations including their power rights as part of their rate base. Relative to the recapture clause, he said he would ask the legislature for an act providing it.

"Note that I still recognize the authority of the legislature," Metschan said. "One candidate is going around telling the people that he wants to be the state's general manager, either ignoring the fact or ignorant that the legislature has considerable authority."

Municipally owned utilities, Metschan said, are too often in the hands of politicians. He cited Seattle as an example with its street car system. Tacoma, he said, has excessively high taxes that more than offset lower utility rates. The legislature has authority, he said, to give the people in rural districts the right to develop power without getting their property confiscated as they would be in danger of doing under the utility district bill.

"If Portland were to establish a municipal power system \$100,000 in taxes now paid by the private utilities would be taken out of the state treasury," Metschan said. "Who would have to pay to make up that amount? Why the taxpayers, of course."

"You hear nothing from the independent candidate about free textbooks. Text-books cost an average of about \$5 a year for each child. You hear nothing about protection of women and children in industry. The growing menace of the great department store thrives on starvation wages for women workers. If I am elected I am going to bring that question to the attention of the legislature."

Metschan made a strong plea in favor of old age pensions.

FACTORY WORKER ADMITS MURDER

Dubuque, Ia. (AP)—The slaying of 12-year-old Earl Fuller, a five best boy with a string of wire about the neck was found near the Mississippi river, was solved Monday, authorities said, with the confession of A. R. Olinger, 22, a factory worker.

Extra guards were thrown about the jail when a crowd gathered after police announced the confession. Authorities, however, did not anticipate any attempts at mob violence.

Olinger was arrested after two boys identified him as the man they had seen in company with the Fuller youth the night he was slain.

Police said Earl was slain after Olinger knocked him unconscious.

NUTS KILL WILDCATS

Columbus, O. (AP)—A "hands off" policy for visitors has been declared by keepers of Municipal Zoo here following the death of two wildcats from eating green buckeyes. The nuts were fed to the animals by visitors, it was said.

JAIL WOMAN TRAVELER

Cleveland, (AP)—Police jailed a woman traveler here, when they caught Mrs. Ethel Pearl 22, formerly of Hymstown, climbing on a freight car. She said she had abandoned her husband in Youngstown and was going to "ride the rails" to Mexico, already having visited Nebraska and Virginia the same way.
