Frederick W. Goodrich of Portland, state president of the Oregon association of music teachers, was a guest of the Salem district music teachers' association at their first meeting of the fall season, held Monday night at the studio of Prof. and Mrs. T. Mr. Goodrich spoke to the education group about plans for the Salem work of the association, raising the standards for credited music teachers, and especially of the desirability of having more music in the public schools. Group teaching in the public schools is advocated by the state association, with the education committee of the association recommending the teachers for the course.

On Goodrich's suggestion, Prof. Frank E. Churchill, president of the Salem district teachers, appointed a committee to work with the state association's education committee and also to arrange plans for the national association's biennial convention at San Francisco in June.
