

INDEPENDENCE READY FOR ANNUAL CORN SHOW

OVER \$500 IN CASH AWARDS FOR EXHIBITS

Independence—Over \$500 in cash prizes will be distributed at the annual Independence corn show scheduled for the army next Friday and Saturday with the displays to include corn, vegetables, alfalfa, honey, flowers, culinary and school exhibits. Door prizes will be awarded each evening with a musical program to be included. Speakers will be present from the University of Oregon and O. A. C.

Sweepstakes will be awarded to exhibitors who have the highest number of points in class with all entries to close Thursday evening at 8:30 o'clock. Entries are open to all growers of Polk county and that part of Marion county immediately adjacent to Independence. No limit is being placed on the number but all exhibits must have been grown in 1930 by the exhibitor and in the junior department displays must be the work of the exhibitor.
