

COUNCIL HEARS ROUTINE PLEAS AT WEST SALEM

West Salem—The city council met in adjourned session Monday evening with the mayor and Henningsen absent. J. A. Gosser presided.

The sewer committee reported on the 300 foot sewer extension asked for on First street following which it was recommended that bids, preferably from West Salem residents, be received to do the work but a motion prevailed that the work be done by day's work and the wage scale be set at \$3. There was a motion made to hire a foreman for the job at 40 cents per hour. The task of hiring the workers was given to the sewer committee.

The courtesy of the floor was extended to Robert Crawford, who asked permission to build a garage on First street at Murlock street. The question was referred to the street committee.

A motion prevailed that the water board confer with Friesen and the Copeland Lumber yard company concerning connecting up with the water main that was laid on Edgewood street for their convenience.

A motion passed that Attorney Cook fix a poll book for the registered voters. Cook suggested a change in the city's books for the ensuing year and that the auditor will be instructed to bring in a detailed report of the city's financial condition to close up the year's work.

Council adjourned to meet again Saturday evening, November 29.

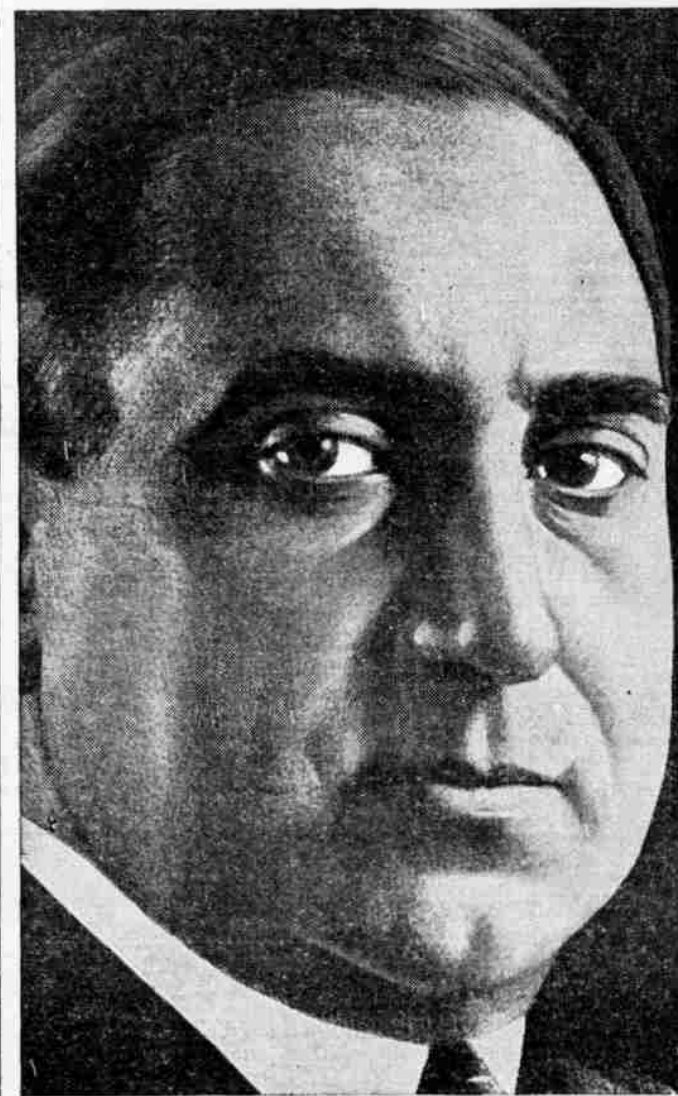
