LINCOLN SOIL SAMPLES SHOW TYPICAL FORM

Lincoln—Two samples of soil taken from the farm of E. E. Buckles, one of white and the other of dark soil, were tested for acidity and phosphorous at the meeting Tuesday evening when C. V. Ruzek of the soils department of the O. A. C. and J. R. Beck, county agent, appeared to address a good sized crowd at the school house, their subject being soil and how to make it work for the farmer. Both samples were typical of the land found in Spring Valley generally. The white sample showed that the soil of that type is acid and is short on phosphorous, and it was stated that this could be built up by using lime to reduce the acidity and a phosphorous fertilizer.
