

EMERGENCY SERVICE STARTED FOR WINTER MONTHS

UNEMPLOYED AT SILVERTON HAS NEEDED ACTION

Silverton—Mayor L. C. Eastman called a special meeting Friday evening for the purpose of forming an emergency employment service for providing work for Silverton jobless people during the coming winter months.

The committee in charge of this service work consists of Mayor Eastman, Norris Amos, president of the chamber of commerce; Mrs. George Hubbs, president of the Women's club; Robert Goetz, superintendent of city schools; and Dr. C. W. Keene, chairman of the water commission.

A constant survey will be made throughout the winter of business houses, factories, mills, home owners for the creation of jobs and an employment bureau, which will be handled through the Eastman Bros. office on North Water street and will act as a listing bureau for all of the city's jobless. These jobless men will be assigned to all work listed in the Eastman bureau.

An investigating committee will make a thorough analysis of each applicant's condition before being assigned a job in order that only those actually needing help will be so provided.

It is also planned to open a food and clothing distributing room which will collect and distribute living necessities to the needy.

It is proposed to place an extremely nominal price on all such articles in order to remove any trace of charity as the idea behind the entire movement is to create work and provide necessities at most reasonable prices in order that Silverton's unemployed may be enabled to help themselves and not be objects of charity.

This distributing room will be located uptown and will be handled through representatives of the local Women's club.

Everybody having a surplus of clothing or foodstuffs is requested to get in touch with the Women's club, and Silverton's unemployed are also requested to notify Mrs. Jones at the Eastman office.

In view of the possibility of an unusual number of unemployed the council, the water commission, the park commission and other city departments will perform every possible bit of improvement during this period in order to create extra work.

Wages will be maintained on a nominal basis since it won't be possible to perform a satisfactory day's work during the bad weather for the next few months. However, the salaries should take care of the living needs and prevent these otherwise unemployed from becoming objects of charity.

Silverton has always prided itself on being a prosperous and self-sustaining community and this movement is only another indication of its sincere desire to further maintain this reputation and it is expected that no suffering will be endured by any Silverton citizens this winter.
