NORBLAD PLANS APPOINTMENTS TO VACANCIES

Governor To Fill Offices As Fast as Terms Expire Till January 12

Meier Can Remove Appointees if Desired — List of Expirations

No appointments that Governor Norblad is privileged to make by law between now and January 12 when his term of office expires will be allowed to go by default, he said Friday. About a dozen offices, made vacant by expiration of terms, will be filled by the present governor immediately after the first of the year, although his successor, Julius L. Meier, will have authority in all cases to remove these appointees when he takes office and fill the places with persons of his own choosing.
