Program Thursday Of Chamber Music Quartet Interests

ONE of the most interesting musical events of the year will be held Thursday night, December 18, in the beautiful O. P. Johnson home, when the Salem Chamber Music society will present the Neah-Kah-Nie string quartet in program. Mrs. William Burghardt will appear with the quartet as guest pianist when the group plays Cesar Franck's Quartet.

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What Paris is Wearing

PARIS—Paris has put its fashion clock back thirty years. At least those are the indications by the number of styles now in vogue that were also popular at the beginning of the century. All of the fanciful ruffles, leg-o-mutton sleeves, bustles, plumes and elaborate jewelry that are associated with the early nineteenth-century are reappearing on Rue de la Paix today.

Furthest among these revivals—and probably the most unexpected of all—is the sudden fashion for plumes of all types. New Rebous hats turn brims over modern equivalents of the cigarette; Patou puts a big curling ostrich on the brim of one of his black hats and allows the feather to trail down over one shoulder. Moynese tucks feathers into his hair, and uses plumes on his tea gowns, in place of fur.

Jeweled reproductions of these revived plumes are already important fashions. They are on hats, on handbags, on shoulder straps, on lapsels on cuffs. Newest of all, they are appearing as jeweled pendants, studded with emeralds, diamonds, and hung from strings of diamonds. One of these new diamond plumes from Rue de la Paix, is pictured.
