MEIER TALKS TO COMMISSIONERS

Portland (AP)—Problems confronting the state by its indebtedness, taxation, highways and unemployment, were treated in detail by Governor-elect Julius L. Meier in his address late Friday before the state association of county judges and commissioners in session here.

As governor Mr. Meier promised a regime of economy and business administration, and invited the cooperation of county officials.

Increased or additional sources of taxation do not increase the spending power of the state, but must reduce by corresponding amount the state tax levy on property, he said. There is a necessity of rigid entrenchment wherever possible on the tax burden of real property.

"It will be my purpose as governor to introduce whatever possible economies in the administration of state affairs. It will be necessary before we obtain full relief to add more wealth to our tax roll and to augment our population," the speaker stated. "I feel in an acute situation, like the present, the big digging machines could be laid aside and man power instead of machine power employed by the highway commission." Mr. Meier urged the cutting of red tape and procedural delays in obtaining unemployment relief.

PISTOL UNDOING OF DRUG THIEVES

RADIO PERMIT AT SEATTLE GRANTED

Washington (AP)—The federal radio commission has denied an application of station KOMO, operated by the Fisher's Bend Station, Inc., of Seattle, Wash., for permission to erect a 15 kilowatt broadcasting station on the 970 kilocycles channel.

Simultaneously, the commission granted an application of station KJRH, operated by the Northwest Broadcasting System, Inc., of Seattle, for permission to erect a five kilowatt RCA transmitter using a frequency of 970 kilocycles. This action terminated a long fight waged by KOMO to obtain permission to broadcast on the same channel as KJRH.

Eugene (AP)—Two shooting scrapes lived Eugene's streets Friday night.

Ray Norman, lumberjack, stepped out of a cafe late in the evening and saw two officers approaching.

"Don't come any closer or I'll shoot," he shouted, displaying a revolver.

The police walked toward him and the man fired four wild shots. A bullet from a .300er revolver struck him in the arm and he submitted to arrest. Officers said he was intoxicated.

O'Brien kicked the man in the face and fled. A second man appeared and shot at the driver who returned the fire.

PAPER MILL WORKER DIES FROM INJURIES

Arthur J. Bard, 55, woodroom foreman at the Oregon Pulp and Paper company, died Saturday morning from internal injuries received at work Thursday noon. Bard was assisting in the moving of railroad freight cars containing wood and log fuel when the accident occurred. He was caught between two cars as they were shoved together.

At the time, Bard did not seem seriously injured. He told fellow employees he felt badly shaken up and would take the afternoon off, so he drove his car to his home at 2244 Hill street. A physician was called Thursday night, but the seriousness of the injuries were not discovered until Friday when Bard was taken to a local hospital. He died following an operation.

Bard has been connected with the paper company for the past eight or nine years, and foreman of the woodroom for more than seven years. He is survived by his wife, Fannie, of Salem; his parents and one brother in Castana, Iowa. Funeral arrangements, under the direction of the Terwilliger funeral home, have not been completed.

FUNERAL HELD FOR SENATOR OVERMAN

Salem, North Carolina (AP)—Lee State Overman came home Saturday for his last long sleep.

A special train bearing the 76-year-old senator's body from Washington where he died early Friday afternoon more than 50 years in the service of the state and nation, arrived here at 9 a. m.

With bowed heads his neighbors who knew him as a kindly friend and a devoted citizen, banded with yellow chrysanthemums and red roses, was lifted from the train and carried to the First Methodist church for the funeral rites Saturday afternoon.

A flag escort from the local post of the American Legion led the slow march from the railway station.

Ill health prevented Senator F. M. Simmons, a friend of Senator Overman for 65 years in college, private life and public service, from attending the funeral. He had been appointed head of the senate delegation of 21, but his physician advised him it would be unsafe for him to make the journey.

Several hundred names are signed to a petition received by Governor Norblad Saturday from Jacksonville county asking that a special prosecutor be appointed to conduct an investigation into the fatal shooting of Everett Dahack in a liquor raid Sunday, November 23. The governor has not yet decided what action he will take.
