Schmeling Ready To Fight Any of Leading Boxers

Berlin, (AP)—Max Schmeling, German boxer, said Friday that he had been traveling and had just received the ultimatum of the New York boxing commission that he accept the challenge of Jack Sharkey, of Boston, for a match in which his title of heavyweight champion will be at stake.

He said he immediately called his reply to the commission that he had instructed his manager, Joe Jacobs, to take up the matter with them in New York.

"Naturally I'll take on any contender regarded by the commission and the public as the likeliest man," he said. "I think it is idle to attempt to determine definitely just now who is to fight me next June, for many things can happen before then. In any case I shall gladly meet any man available then whether his name is Sharkey, Stripling or Carrera."

ROCKNE WILL TEACH COACHING SCHOOL

Corvallis (AP)—Knut Rockne, Notre Dame mentor, will conduct the football coaching school at the Oregon State campus next summer, it was announced Friday by Dean M. Ellwood, director of the summer session.

Confirmation of his appointment was received Thursday night from the board of higher education. Rockne had arranged with Coach Paul J. Schisler to give his only coaching school at Corvallis. He was a member of the summer staff here four years in succession, but had to cancel his engagements the past two years.

RUDOLPH NEW CHAMP IN POCKET BILLIARDS

New York, (AP)—Once more the world's pocket billiards championship belongs to Erwin Rudolph, spectacular shotmaker from Chicago.

Rudolph staged a great uphill fight to suppress the defending champion, Ralph Greenleaf of New York, in the final match of the championship round-robin tournament Thursday night, 125-120 in 37 innings, and wound up his tournament record with seven straight victories. Greenleaf was runner-up with five victories and two defeats.

The Chicagoan held the world's title once before, defeating Greenleaf in a challenge match here in January, 1927.

CLUBMEN FROM PORTLAND WILL FACE BEARCATS

The scoring combination of Scates, Adams and Cardinal, aided and abetted by two husky guards, Percy Carpenter and Lawrence Gibson, will be seen in action for the first time this year, when Coach Keene's Willamette university basketball team takes the floor at 8 o'clock Friday evening against a group of former college and high school stars, playing under the colors of the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club of Portland.

The first of the year for the Northwest conference champions of last season, promises to be a hot affair since the clubmen are known to be perfectly willing to mix matters.

Considerable scrimmage has been indulged in by the Bearcats and this has resulted in placing them in fairly good condition, although Coach Keene is not regarding a game as to the outcome of Friday night's fracas. One of his most likely candidates for first team honors, Andy Peterson, will not get into the game since an injury to a foot will probably keep him on the bench until after Christmas.

Don Faber, Fred Paul and Gus Moore, experienced men, will doubtless find themselves in the basket shooting berths before the evening's entertainment has been concluded, while Kloostera, a freshman recruit from Oregon City is understood for Ed Cardinal, janky tip-off man, Hauderree, last year's substitute, and Kaiser, playing his first season for Willamette, will replace Carpenter and Gibson.

The personnel of the clubmen includes Edwards and Gaudier, of University of Oregon fame; Hubstad of the University of Washington, John Ingis and a number of other luminaries.

The clubmen have played two games this year, being defeated by Oregon State in each instance. This was to be expected, however, since the Orange crew, mostly seasoned veterans, is expected to cut some figure in Pacific coast basketball circles this season. Individually the Multnomah players have the ability and they are expected to show greatly improved teamwork on the Willamette gym floor Friday evening.

BAER TO MEET BOSTON BOXER

New York (AP)—Two members of the "youngster set," Ernie Schaaf of Boston and Max Baer of San Francisco, clash in the feature bout in Madison Square Garden Friday night with high hopes of landing in the foreground of the heavyweight picture.

Schaaf, although he has campaigned successfully in the east for several years, never before has had a chance to perform in the Garden. Baer will be making his debut in the east.

The Pacific coast lad has been well advertised. It remains to be seen whether he can live up to his advance notices. His record would seem to indicate that he can for he has won 24 of his 27 matches by knockouts and been beaten only once. Schaaf is one of the best of the younger heavyweights. He holds two decisions over Tommy Loughran, clever Philadelphian, and also has beaten old Johnny Rinko.

ENGLISH LAD FAILS TO WHIP CARNERA

London (AP)—Reggie Meen, a pluck-cheeked English lad, went back to a north of England shoe factory Friday, a sadder and wiser heavyweight.

Carnera thought he could whip Primo Carnera, Italian mammoth, and discovered he was mistaken.

Carnera toyed with Meen for one round in Albert hall Thursday night and then settled down to the business in hand. Early in the second round he floored the Briton but Reggie got up. Another powerful blow sent him to the canvas again and the referee mercifully stepped in and halted the bout.

Carnera weighed 268 pounds, Meen 203.

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Old Standard Golf Ball Barred; Final Play Comes Sunday

Pasadena (UP)—Using the new bigger and lighter golf ball, a field of 188 golfers started play Friday in the annual Pasadena \$4,000 open tournament on the Brookside municipal course. The old standard golf ball was barred from competition for the first time in history. The new ball—1.55 ounces in weight and 1.68 inches in diameter—does not become compulsory until January 1, but the large field of professionals requested the tournament officials to bar the old ball in order to get accustomed to the new one before the \$10,000 Los Angeles and \$25,000 Auna Caliente tournaments next month.

Eighteen holes were scheduled Friday, with the last 100 scores and ties playing the second 18 Saturday. The low 48 scores and ties will play the final 36 holes Sunday.

Heading the select group of professionals were Horton Smith, Gragston, N. Y., defending champion; Leo Diegel, Craig Wood, Bloomfield, N. J., who won the tournament two years ago; Harry Cooper, Al Simpson, Walter Hagen, Olin Dutra and Joe Kirkwood.

RUMORS OF ROCKNE QUITTING PERSIST

South Bend (AP)—The big rumor and report boys around South Bend still persist in resigning Knute Rockne's job for him.

The latest gossip is Rockne will retire as Notre Dame's football coach but will remain as athletic director. The boys have even lined up candidates as his successor, namely Hunk Anderson, present first assistant to Rockne; Harry Stohldreher, quarterback of the famous "four horsemen"; and now coach at Villanova; Jimmy Phelan, now head coach at the University of Washington, and Eddie "Slip" Madigan, coach at St. Mary's college, California.

Ticknor and Curcio are the only names on this year's list who also appeared on the Collier's All-Americans of 1929.

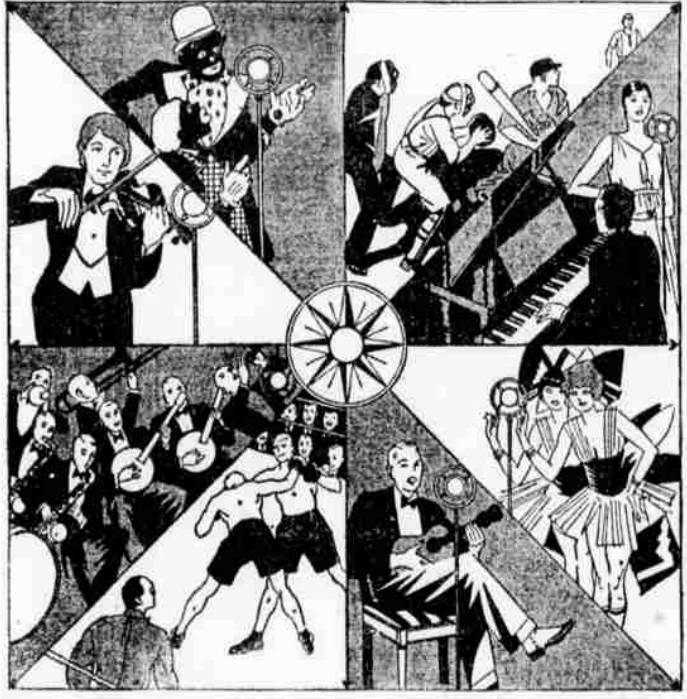
AAU AND YMCA PLAN COMBINE

The conference will be held some time between December 28 and January 3.

Gustav T. Kirby, of New York, past president of the A. A. U., will head that body's committee, and will have as associates, Charles A. Brennan of Detroit, J. Frank Percy of Cambridge, Mass., Frederick W. Rubin and Daniel J. Ferris, both of New York.

Membership in the A. A. U. would give the Y. M. C. A. representation at all meetings as well as on the board of governors.



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
