

VALLEY WINDS DAMAGE LINES AT JEFFERSON

Jefferson—The heavy windstorm early Monday morning played havoc with the telephone lines and Mountain State power lines in this community. The people in the south part of town and also along the highway north of the city limits, were without lights for a time Monday.

The local toll circuits between Jefferson and Albany went out early in the morning and until they were repaired no communication could be held with outside stations. Several farmer and local town lines were put out of commission. Considerable damage to fruit trees in this locality has been reported. A large cherry tree on the Hugh Blyden farm south of town was broken off even with the ground.

The Santiam river is rising very slowly and Monday morning stood just four feet above the low water mark.

Falls City—The "old second hand store" which is being wrecked by Carl Smith, was blown down by the heavy windstorm early Monday morning. No other damage was reported.
