DALLAS COUNCIL LAUNCHES YEAR OFFICES FILLED

Dallas—The city council met in regular session Monday evening with the following members present: Mayor Finelli, Commissioner Sundberg, Morrison, Allgood, Dalton, Peterson, Retzer, Wick, Sawyer; City Attorney Hayter, City Marshal Neufeldt and Street Commissioner Osburn.

The annual report of the city fire chief, Walter L. Young, was read by the auditor, J. R. Craven. The complete audit of the city's book was presented by Conda J. Ham, Portland, who also presented several recommendations to the council and in passing made the remark that few cities in the state could show their books audited to date on the fifth day of the new year.

A copy of a contract in regard to the housing, etc., of the city's fire fighting equipment read by the city attorney met with the unanimous approval of the council.

Only one bid was received for the bond covering the balance of the Ulgive avenue intercepting sewer. It came from the city bank and was accepted by the members.

At this point the mayor and recently elected members of the council took the oath of office.

Election of city officers for the coming year resulted in Oscar Hayter receiving a unanimous vote for city attorney. W. G. Yarnall, a similar vote for treasurer. Tony Neufeldt was re-elected chief of police over two other applicants, I. D. Smith and V. E. Gossio. Neufeldt received seven votes, Gossio one, Smith none. For the position of street commissioner, R. Osburn and E. S. Campbell received four votes each on three different ballots. The mayor declined to cast the deciding vote and held over the election till the next meeting, and instructed Osburn to carry on in the meantime.
