

JESUITS SEEK WATER SUPPLY FROM SHERIDAN

Sheridan—A large crowd was present Monday evening in the city hall to witness the hearing of the city officers for 1931. New councilmen are: R. D. Lathrop, C. S. Alwood, and T. L. Bockus. Old councilmen are: T. K. Heider, M. Kramboerger, and W. A. Gage. Other officers are: Mayor, Dr. R. C. Field; marshal, Elery Townsend; recorder, Leland Sackett; treasurer, Lawa Smith. Dr. Field is serving the city as mayor for the third time.

Several matters of importance were presented, chief of which were the consideration of purchasing a new fire truck, and the probability of sufficient water supply to furnish the Jesuit novitiate with drinking water. Neither matter was acted upon.

Inefficient water supply is an important issue with the Society of Jesus, whose holdings just north-west of Sheridan in what is known as Paradise farm, are in part located high above the lower acreage. When the property was bought last year for the construction of a Jesuit novitiate the society was assured that the necessary supply of water could easily be obtained.

Until sufficient drinking water to supply a college is assured, construction cannot begin. Work was expected to begin early this year and a delegation from Paradise came before the city council Monday evening and gave a survey of the situation, asking that the city of Sheridan supply them with drinking water.

Until the council is assured that the present supply will more than meet the needs of the city nothing would be assured the society.
