Mr. Smith's statement: "To my mind the democratic party will soon be in control and will make this a happy as well as a prosperous nation."

"This statement, which purports to come from me as of August 21, was never issued by me. At that time in August, the Joel Parker association of Newark, N. J., was holding an annual reunion and dinner."

"I refused the invitation to attend the dinner but on August 19, some over-enthusiastic admirer of mine sent letters to the editor of the Newark Evening News and signed my name to it."

"My first knowledge of it was when I saw the newspaper headlines quoting me."

"I made careful investigation among my own staff and found it had not emanated from my own office nor anyone connected with it."

"We traced the matter and it was ascertained by all concerned that the telegram had been a hoax and we made careful denial in all newspapers by statement on August 21st, 1930."

"Of course, a denial never catches up with an original statement. It did not in this instance or else it was deliberately disregarded."

"Since, on the face of the testimony, this cartoon was distributed in these various states to the extent of 800,000 copies, I think that an apology and reparation is due me from the republican national committee which permitted its director to do this and that I am entitled to have 800,000 copies of a statement showing that I was falsely quoted, distributed just as widely as the original cartoon was and to the same organizations."

"I would like to spread this matter upon the minutes of the next hearing of the Nye committee and to give publicity to it in any other form which occurs to you as most likely to correct the injustice that has been done to me and Mr. Raskob, by saying nothing of Senator Norris."

F. F. Cretchet, Nye committee auditor, testified before the committee Tuesday that some special editions of the Ku Klux Klan paper, 'Fellowship Forum,' had been sent into Montana, Kentucky, Alabama and West Virginia. Some of the editions carried the 'wet' cartoon."

He investigated the records of the Independent Publishing company, which prints the Forum, and found over \$3,000 worth of the special editions of the paper had been ordered by former Senator Robison, republican of Kentucky."

He said Senator Hefflin, who ran as an independent in Alabama in the last election, ordered all but one of the editions sent to Alabama and paid for them himself."

OBITUARY

Francis W. Devaney, 70, was conducted Sunday afternoon at the Christian church in Scio by Rev. Bennett, First Adventist pastor of Lebanon and interment was in the Franklin Butte cemetery near Scio.

The seating capacity of the church was taxed and a large concourse of friends followed the remains to the cemetery. Rev. Bennett paid a high tribute to Devaney, whom he said he had known to be a faithful and consistent Christian. The choir consisted of Mrs. E. D. Myers, Mrs. Iva Abbott, Mrs. F. T. Blythe, Miss Gloria Long, Riley Shelton, Miss Thurston, with Miss Pentney at the piano. Active pallbearers, members of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows of which he had been a member for 38 years were Tom Small, W. H. Young, N. I. Morrison, J. L. Davenport, J. P. Oupor and Lee Blythe. Honorary pallbearers were old friends and neighbors of the deceased.

Devaney was born in Missouri February 2, 1860, and died at the home of his daughter in LaGrande, Oregon, January 7, 1931. He had been in declining health for two years and for the last few months had been practically an invalid.

He came to Oregon with his parents during the Civil war and he made his home in this state to the time of his death with the exception of a short time spent in Montana. He grew to manhood in the Scio region, having followed farming most of his life.

His widow, formerly Miss Mary J. Ferry, survives. Mrs. Lawrence Compton, Albany, and Mrs. E. L. Kates, LaGrande, are the only surviving daughters. C. H. DeVaney and R. L. DeVaney, the only surviving sons, reside at Wolf Point, Mont. A daughter, Pearl Wolf, died in infancy and is buried in the family plot which received the remains of her father last Sunday.

The final funeral services in the Odd Fellows lodge was held at the graveside.

FRANK A. TALBOTT Sheridan—The last surviving member of Donaldson post, G. A. R. of Sheridan passed away at his home in Sheridan January 11 at the age of 84 years, 10 months and 3 days.

Frank A. Talbott was born February 18, 1846 near Greencastle, Indiana. At the age of 13 he moved with his parents, William and Harriet Pearson Talbott, to Central City, Missouri.

In the fall of 1863 he enlisted at St. Katherine, Missouri, in Company F, 12th Mo. cavalry, serving under Col. Wells L. Col. Brown and Capt. Krigley. He served two and one-half years, one year being after the Civil war closed. After having spent the winter of '65 and '66 at Ft. Laramie, Wyoming, he was mustered out in April, 1866 at Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas.

Talbott was sent to help subdue the Indians then uprising in the western part of the country and was under Gen. Wheaton, then in command of the Powder river expedition in Montana.
