

TRAFFIC OVER BRIDGE TAKES SERIOUS FORM

Jefferson—A traffic jam which might have resulted in a serious catastrophe occurred on the Jefferson bridge Sunday afternoon.

A large oil truck with a trailer tank, going south met a large truck with a trailer, traveling north at about the center of the bridge. Due to the extreme narrowness of the bridge it is impossible for two trucks or buses of the larger size to pass. Before one of these trucks could back off, the trailer, which is exceptionally heavy on Sundays, had closed in and the manner in which the bridge swayed was alarming. It looked for a time as if there might be danger of a collapse.

Finally the right way was cleared at the east end of the bridge and the oil truck backed off which, with the trailer tank, made it a very difficult and dangerous task. By the time traffic was resumed there were probably 40 or 50 cars at each end of the bridge.

John C. Stegmann, county judge of Marion county, accompanied by his wife, was caught in the jam near the center of the bridge.

This incident is one which might occur at any time. It is a common sight to see trucks and buses backing off the bridge in order to let other trucks pass.
