Inaugural Ball Gala Social Event

Resplendent in lovely gowns, full dress suits, or formal military attire of the United States army and the Oregon national guard, distinguished citizens of the entire state gathered as guests of the capital city to complement Governor and Mrs. Julius L. Meier in the third formal inaugural ball to be held in the history of Oregon. The brilliant ball which climaxed the opening day of the 34th Oregon legislative assembly, and inauguration ceremonies for Governor Meier, was by far the largest social function to be held in Salem since social affairs became an integral part in the official life of the capital city.

Augmented by the numerous Portland people who arrived on the special train at 8:30 o'clock, before the opening hour of 9 o'clock the large ballroom at the armory was crowded with guests. Robert Boardman, as master of ceremonies, welcomed the assembly on behalf of the Hon. T. A. Lavesley, former mayor of Salem under whom plans for the ball were started, and the present mayor, P. M. Gregory.

The official army salute to the governor and a special orchestration of "Oregon, My Oregon" greeted the receiving line, as headed by Governor and Mrs. Meier and by Major George Dutton of Portland, who introduced to the line, they made an impressive entry. At 10:45 o'clock with a long line of guests still waiting to be received by the governor and his party, it was estimated that more than 2000 people had filed by.

The line, in regular order, included Governor and Mrs. Meier, the Hon. Willard Marks, president of the senate, and Mrs. Marks; the Hon. Frank Longman, speaker of the house, and Mrs. Longman; the Hon. T. B. Kay, state treasurer, and Mrs. Kay; the Hon. Hal Hoss, secretary of state, and Mrs. Hoss; Chief Justice H. J. Bean, and Mrs. Bean; the Hon. E. E. Brodie, American minister to Finland, and Mrs. Brodie; Adjutant-General and Mrs. George A. White; Major-General and Mrs. Paul A. Wolf of Vancouver, B.C.; and the Hon. and Mrs. T. A. Lavesley.

Mrs. Meier wore an exquisite imported gown of white satin, with a shoulder bouquet of orchids. Pearls and long diamond earrings added to her costume. Mrs. Marks was in black chiffon embroidered with jet and brilliants. Mrs. Longman used a smart frock of black chiffon and brilliants, with effective lines. Mrs. T. B. Kay was charming in white chiffon trimmed with pascuementerie with stunning lines, a shoulder corsage of gardenias, and a long rope of pearls.

After the installation of officers, a number of international regimens, the Chicago Civic Opera company will visit Portland March 12, 13 and 14 for a gala season of four operas, at the Portland Public Auditorium.

A large committee of Portland citizens has underwritten the engagement which is to cost \$62,000 and plans are being made for the season as the outstanding social and musical event of the year. The company will make only four appearances on the Pacific coast, the four including only Los Angeles, San Francisco, Seattle and Portland. The entire Chicago organization including the cast, chorus, ballet and orchestra—314 persons in all—will travel across the continent in three special trains with one special train of 17 baggage cars carrying the scenery, equipment and lighting effects. In the northwest the company will present four operas in Seattle and four in Portland.

As an extraordinary musical attraction the company will bring to the Pacific coast this year for the first time the great German cast organized to present the popular German opera Die Walkure. This cast will include such noted German artists as Frida Leider, Maria Olzewska and Alexander Kipnis, all of whom were assembled in Chicago this season for a number of great performances in German.
