

"NAVY BILL" INGRAM TO COACH CALIFORNIA BEAR

INSTRUCTOR AT NAVAL ACADEMY SUCCEEDS PRICE

Berkeley (AP)—University of California's Bear, once the toast of far western football, will bid for gridiron glory this year under the leadership of smiling Bill Ingram, late of the U. S. naval academy.

Announcement of the appointment of "Navy Bill" was made Monday by the executive committee of the associated students, ruling body of student affairs at the university. It was a mere formality as Ingram had been signed to a three year contract 10 days previously by Graduate Manager W. W. Monahan, who went east last month empowered to select a new coach.

The new coach will take over his duties March 1. He already has sent word he will recommend one or two assistants, one probably E. E. Miller, present line coach at Annapolis. It is understood Jack Chevigny, now assistant to Knute Rockne at Notre Dame, is in line for the other assistant berth under Ingram.

Neither a "miracle man" of football nor one of the old masters, Ingram, nevertheless, has a record comparable to that of any of the younger coaches. He is 34 years old. Graduate Manager Monahan commented on his selection as follows: "We have chosen Ingram because of his splendid qualities of personality and leadership."

Ingram was a backfield star for Navy from 1916 to 1919, being named all-American quarterback in the latter year. He learned football under Gil Dobie and in 1919 was recalled to Annapolis to act as the latter's assistant.

No mention was made of salary but it is believed he will receive at least \$10,000 per year, possibly \$12,000 and not more than \$15,000. It is understood Manager Monahan was authorized to offer as high as \$15,000.

With 5000 men students to draw from and an unusually strong squad of line-men coming up from the freshman squad, Ingram will not have much difficulty assembling material. Six seasoned performers coming back next fall include: Schindler, Griffiths, Gill, Valiano, and Kirwan, backfield men, and Fritz, Calin, tackle.

Ingram is known as an "attacking strategist" and favors the Warner wing-back formation, necessarily modified by his own type of play. In Henry Schindler, brilliant sophomore halfback last year, he will have a first-footed ball carrier such as this system of offense requires.

Coaches in this section whose teams will oppose those of Ingram, had high words of praise for the newcomer.

It was the first time the Philadelphia had been knocked out. After Adgie had landed half a dozen blows on his head and body, Walker bounced a left to the jaw that caused his knees to buckle. Another to the same spot had the kerman groggy. As another clipped him, Adgie hit the floor with a thud. The referee stopped the bout.

Muddling of Fight Situation Goes On "Pa" Not Pleased

New York (AP)—The complex heavyweight situation has reached the point where the fighters are being asked to sign not for one bout but for three. The plight of Young Bill

Young Bill's father-manager, "Pa" Stribling, was all set to sign Bill to a title match with Max Schmeling in June. Now they're asking him to agree to two more battles in the event that Stribling relieves Schmeling of the championship. They want Bill first to meet Primo Carnera in September, "they" being the Hearst milk fund officials and Bill Carey, president of Madison Square Garden, unofficially. Then they would have Stribling agree to fight again in 1932 against the best available opponent for the milk fund alone. Under the terms of this three edged proposal, Stribling would post \$25,000 of his 12 1/2 percent cut in the Schmeling-Stribling gate as a forfeit for the match with Carnera.

"Pa" Stribling took this offering under advisement although it was plain he was not particularly pleased with it.

Monday's conferences were between milk fund promoters, representatives of Stribling and Schmeling and Bill Duffy, American manager of Carnera. Bill Carey was not there for a New York commission order forbidding, under pain of suspension, any promoter to negotiate with a suspended fighter.

Carnera has been under suspension here since his unsatisfactory bout with Leon Chevalier in California last year, and Schmeling and his manager, Joe Jacobs, were placed under the ban last week when the commission vacated Der Maxie's crown because he failed to agree immediately to a title bout with Jack Sharkey.

DUDLEY PLAYS WINNING GOLF TO TAKE FIRST

Los Angeles (AP)—Led by big Ed Dudley, Wilmington, Del., professional, a chosen handful of the winter golfing army Tuesday took the Rainbow Trail to Agua Caliente, seeing the \$25,000 pot of gold which awaits the winner of this world's richest tournament.

It was the smiling Dudley's right to head the march, for Monday he demonstrated a golden golfing touch by winning the Los Angeles \$10,000 open and the attendant prize money of \$2500. Coming almost out of nowhere Monday, the former Georgian gambled with his shots and won a champion's place in the sixth annual Los Angeles test by posting a score of 235 to lead the field by two strokes.

Dudley had never won a major tournament. Most of the followers said he was too good natured and easy going to reach the heights. For sixty-nine holes his play went unheralded and almost without mention, although he had registered scores of 72, 73, 72 for the first three rounds.

As Big Ed came to the difficult sixteenth Monday and downed a 30-foot putt for a birdie 3 and the gallery awakened to the fact that here was a youth who might take things into his own hands and settle the first place question. He did by making a champion's shot of the eighteenth which won the tournament. Behind a tree with his second, he bravely pitched over to the Barranca isolated green. The ball dropped sixteen feet from the pin. As courageously, Dudley boldly pitched for a par and got it with the one stroke giving him a 68 for the concluding round, one under par.

In the meantime, the leading quartet had individually blown to pieces. Eddie Loos and Al Stephens came in with 74's for a total of 287 and second place. They won \$1312.50 each. Next came Tommy Armour, who tied with Frank Walsh, Chicago, with 288. This earned them \$500.

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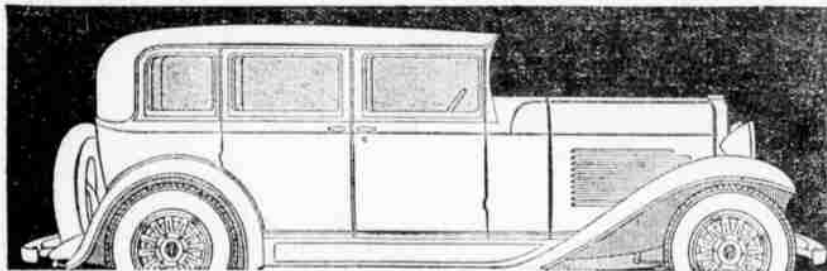
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
