Orchestra Presents Program

In their second public appearance since their reorganization in September, the Salem Symphony orchestra under the direction of Prof. R. W. Haas Seltz presented an enjoyable program Tuesday night at the Oregon state hospital. State officials including State Treasurer T. B. Kay, Secretary of State and Mrs. Hal Ross, out-of-town guests, hospital attendants, inmates and a number of invited guests attended the concert.

The orchestra, which includes more than 30 instruments, gave an outstanding performance considering the length of time the group has been training under the instruction of Prof. Seltz and the fact that all members are amateur musicians enjoying the satisfaction and play of music. The balance of instruments and the confidence in and sympathetic response to feature directing is an unusual feature which distinguishes this amateur symphony orchestra.

The picturesque tone picture, "The Persian Market" (Ketchy), climaxed a finely balanced program. The graphic number was particularly impressive and inspirational, and was played with verve and enthusiasm and a delicate imagery by the group.

The Swedish Festival March, with a swinging rhythm, opened the concert impressively. Godard's "Adagio Pathétique" was given with unusual mastery. The versatile overture to the opera "Pique Dame" by Franz von Suppe, effectively showed the balance of the orchestral group. Delightfully smooth and melodious numbers were Elgar's "Salute d'Amour" and the waltz "Cristobirini" by Pentalozza.

Mrs. Vida Lou Starr, soprano, and Saul Paul, violinist, assisted in the concert with solo numbers. Prof. Seltz playing their accompaniments.

Brief talks were given by Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner, superintendent of the hospital, whose invitation the orchestra appeared; Mr. Kay and Mr. Ross. Governor J. J. L. Meier, who had expected to be present, was detained by visitors from Portland.

Following the program, the orchestra personnel and invited guests were guests of Dr. Steiner at a long supper. Informal talks and songs entertained the group. Covers were placed for approximately 125 at long tables decorated with baskets of flowers. Prof. Seltz presided as toastmaster. Members of the orchestra who live in Dallas, Silverton, Marquam and other nearby towns, together with members of the old-time Salem symphony orchestra, gave their impressions of the orchestra's work. Dr. Steiner complimented the or-

chestra and expressed his gratitude to Prof. Seltz who has arranged many entertainments for the inmates at the state hospital.

The Salem Symphony orchestra, which was organized in 1919, was reorganized this past September under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. Rehearsals are held every Tuesday night in the Y. M. C. A. rooms at 7:30 o'clock promptly. The orchestra is preparing for a public concert this spring.
