Salem, in fact, they state, is the only town with terminal facilities in this section equipped to handle the freight traffic. It will probably mean, they say, the addition of two crews here, at least, when the new plans get under way.

All of the freight must come into Salem, they say, because the Valsetz trains must be broken up for serouting of the cars and this will be done here, with some going north, some going south, and some routed for eastern shipment. When the big new imman-Poulsen development comes on there is no telling to what extent it may increase the freight traffic over the Valsetz road and it may mean an entire rehabilitation of the lines between here and Independence to handle the heavy business which will roll down the Valsetz, into Independence and on into Salem, and from here to be broken up for destinations all over the country.

The present business of the Valsetz now includes a considerable number of log fuel cars, the meat of them routed directly into Salem for either industrial or domestic consumption in this city. Some of them go elsewhere but mostly in this immediate section.
