SCIO BUYS SITE FOR CITY WATER PUMPING PLANT

Scio—Prospects of expensive litigation, with uncertain results, have been eliminated in the recent purchase by the town council of Scio of a small plot of ground from the Scio Mill & Elevator company on which the city's water plant and pumping equipment are located. Negotiations have been pending for a year or more and the final papers were completed a few days ago.

The consideration is \$400 for a tract with 100 feet north frontage and extending south to the center of the channel of Thomas creek. The deal also carries a right-of-way 20 feet wide from the property to Mill street, thus making the recently-acquired property accessible at all times by the city's representatives and others interested.

Under the terms of the purchase it is stated the mill company cancels the asserted contract existing between the company and the city council whereby the latter was to pay the former \$20 a month for rental and the water for the company's mill race for a term of years expiring January 1, 1945. It was a 20-year agreement, it is claimed by the company. The town council some time ago ignored the alleged contract and the company indicated it would test the matter in court, if necessary.

However, the sale of the plot to the city is said to have amicably disposed of that feature. It is understood a clause is incorporated in the recent deal whereby the city is to occupy the premises purchased for a period of 10 years with its water plant, pumping system, etc. It is further stated the company verbally agreed to furnish water to the city from the mill race for \$10 per month, at the option of the city.

It is stated that drilling operations will be started on the property within a short time. It is deemed advisable, at the suggestion of the driller, to reinforce the bridge that now spans the mill race in order to transport the heavy machinery of the driller to the point at which drilling is to begin. This structure, which has been in use several years, was materially damaged and weakened by the fire of August, 1928, which destroyed the mill and the elevator. Work is to be completed on this bridge this week, it is stated, in anticipation of the arrival of the driller from Portland within a few days thereafter.

Details of the deal were laid before the council by Mayor W. A. Ewing at the regular meeting Thursday evening. Council members present were: W. F. Gill, N. I. Morrison, A. L. Plummer and W. Z. Sims. The transaction was ratified by the council.

Interest on \$15,000 outstanding against the city, amounting to \$450.50, was ordered paid. The bill of the mill company to February 1, 1931, for \$120, for rental and water privileges, also was allowed by the council.
