



AIR SAFETY INSURED BY NEW AIRPLANE

New York (AP)—A foolproof airplane which its inventor claims will neither stall, spin nor dive and will land itself is the latest contribution to safety in the air.

While more than a hundred aeronautical experts and financiers watched, the plane was successfully tested at Glenn H. Curtis airport. Piloted by Henry White, it made half a dozen short flights and came to a near-perfect landing each time with the pilot's hands high above his head.

The designer is A. A. Merrill, of White Plains, N. Y., formerly in charge of aeronautical research of the California Institute of Technology, and a contemporary of the Wright Brothers, Octave Chanute

and Langley. He has been working on the plane since 1913 and at one time was forced to mortgage his life insurance to continue.

Movable wings which can be adjusted over an arc of 14 degrees are the secret of the plane's stability. In flight, these retracting flying surfaces prevent a pilot from unwittingly going into a stall or a dive. In landing, they mechanically level off at the proper distance from the ground and assume the proper gliding angle.

The pilot controls the wings from the cockpit by a crank and push-rod mechanism which is calibrated arbitrarily and rotates from zero, in respect to the fuselage, to an angle of incidence of 14 degrees. In taking off, he sets them at an angle that will preserve his trim. When landing, he cranks them to the maximum point, locks the crank and allows the plane to drift downward.

"It is not so much what it will do," Mr. Merrill said, "as what it will not do that is important. It is definitely a plane to fly and not to stunt because you cannot stunt it."
