

MAJOR LEAGUE BALL TEAMS A WAIT OPENING GAMES

ATHLETICS AND CARDINALS ARE FAVORED TO WIN

New York (AP)—Major league baseball teams awaited Tuesday's opening of the National and American league campaigns.

Except for the New York Giants and Chicago White Sox, who are billed with exhibitions with Army and Toledo, the big leaguers have completed conditioning workouts, and only light loosening-up drills are on tap Monday.

Philadelphia's Athletics and the St. Louis Cardinals are the popular favorites to retain the honors won in 1930, with Washington receiving the minority vote in the American league and Chicago and Brooklyn finding considerable support in the National.

The National league race is regarded as a five-team struggle with St. Louis, Chicago, Brooklyn, New York and Pittsburgh each conceded better than a fighting chance. Philadelphia and Washington are expected to battle it out in the American league.

The opening day schedules are: National league: Brooklyn at Boston; Pittsburgh at Chicago; St. Louis at Cincinnati; and New York at Philadelphia.

American league: Detroit at St. Louis; Chicago at Cleveland; Philadelphia at Washington; and Boston at New York. Teams opening the season away from home will make their home debuts on April 22, with the exception of Brooklyn, which will profit by Philadelphia's Sunday baseball law, and appear at Ebbets' field for a single game with the Phillies on April 19.

Junior Baseball To Start Next Week, Boys Assigned To Teams

Managers of the four junior baseball teams which will participate in the preliminary games in the near future, together with their players Monday were scouting every possible boy in an effort to bolster their strength before the first tussle comes.

A lottery held Saturday afternoon distributed the boys who signed up at the meeting last week, among the four managers. Until the deal line is reached scouting for more material will be in order.

Managers of the respective teams wish the players assigned them to get in touch with them at the earliest possible moment, in order that practice may be started immediately. A schedule will be arranged and play probably started next week.

Bobby Jones, being in the movies, and on the air, and out of competitive golf forever, has evolved an idea to which he intends to devote the remainder of his public golfing career—which, necessarily, must be restricted to exhibition matches in the interests of Sweet Charity.

"I intend to play exhibition matches for charity," said Bobby, "when-

ever and wherever the opportunity offers, with this stipulation, I'm going to ask for 25 per cent of the receipts to go to charity trust fund in Atlanta, Ga., the remainder to go to the local charity putting on the match.

"This trust fund is to be held under my direction, so far as business matters of the principal or interest are concerned, and I hope that in a few years it may accumulate to an amount that is worth while—it's not going to be doled out piecemeal.

"Now that I am out of the competitive phase of the game forever I want to feel that I'm doing something for my home town and my home state with the game which I have loved all my life. Of course I cannot go ahead and make up any schedule calling for regular appearances—but I intend to play whenever people want me to, and it can be done."

It was on this basis that Bobby played late in March at Agate Caliente with Leo Diegel against George Von Elm and Mortie Dutra. A match also is planned in Portland, Oregon, and a couple in the Los Angeles district before Bobby is finished with his movie series.

William Wrigley, owner of the Chicago Cubs, who has been putting on a high priced professional, or open, golf tournament in the winter at Catalina Island, has become impressed with the importance of more and better amateur competitions, and this spring, about the middle of April, he announces the first Bobby Jones Amateur Invitation tournament.

It was a suggestion, I believe, of Darsie L. Darsie, Los Angeles golf writer, and will supplant the open event of former seasons.
