EXEMPTION CLAIMS MUST BE COMPLETED

Willamita—Spanish-American and World War veterans who wish to file claims for tax exemption of \$1000 assessed property valuation on the grounds of 40 percent or more disability should do so before May 15, in order to get consideration for the 1931 assessment, County Assessor W. L. Osborn told local applicants.

The assessor states that the exemption conferred on ex-servicemen is strictly limited to those who can produce evidence of the required disability rating. The official certificate issued to the claimant by the United States veterans' administration, or a duly certified copy thereof, will be accepted as proof of such disability, Osborn says. The assessor points out that there is nothing in the law giving the amendment a retroactive effect, hence it does not confer exemptions with respect to assessments and taxes for the year 1930.
