ROUTE EXTENSION ORDERED FOR SCIO

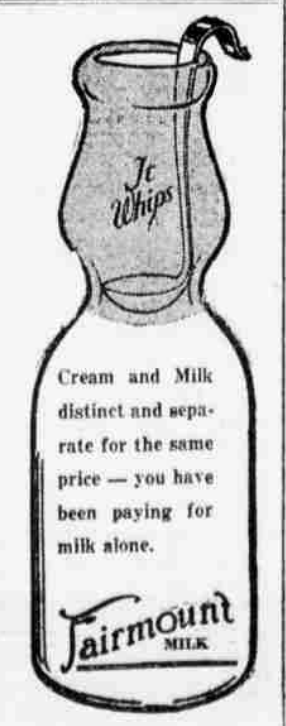
