C. 39 months, driving every day from Monmouth, an average of 1000 miles per month. During the greater part of this time she has had an 8 o'clock class.

Last July, Mrs. Miller was granted a B. S. degree in education. Since then she has been doing graduate work looking forward to a master's degree at the close of summer school this year. For 14 years Mrs. Miller was a grade school teacher and for six years prior to 1928 was supervising critic in methods at the Normal school in Monmouth.

In addition to the 36,000 miles traveled going to and from school, she has made trips to Yellowstone park, Rocky mountain national park, Glacier national park, Lake Louise, Grand Canyon, Mexico, Spokane, and twice to Los Angeles besides several shorter trips. These have totaled upward of 15,000 miles.
