

CREW FIGHTING FOREST BLAZES AROUND COLTON

Molalla—A forest fire has been raging in the Elwood district east of Colton, which started June 5. The exact origin of the fire was not known but State Forest Ranger J. W. Ferguson reported that it was evidently caused by someone dropping a cigarette or match in the woods while peeling casaca bark. Ranger Ferguson put men on the fire immediately following the report and it was under control by that evening. Thirty men were helping fight it.

The humidity was extremely low, being at 14 when the fire broke out and it did not take long to get a head start. Mr. Ferguson said that 30 was considered a fire hazard. Due to the recent wind storms causing so many limbs and pine needles to be underfoot and so little snow in the mountains, and streams being so low there is great danger of fires. Between 40 and 50 acres were burned over.

A small fire about a fourth of a mile from the Elwood fire was reported by Ferguson, that started June 6. This was also thought to have been caused by a match or cigarette stub as many men have been in the woods peeling casaca bark in that territory the past two weeks. Ferguson is in charge of the North Fork ranger station, eight miles east of Molalla. He says that fires this early in the season are an exception. The first had ones usually start the middle of July and may be expected during August and September.

Irish who first volunteered, for the work done by them in soliciting the Silverton community for funds to be used for the painting of the outside of the hospital. The solicitors obtained \$184 and after calling for bids both for paint and the work of painting, Martin Warwick was awarded the job of painting the building for \$78 and Silver Pails company will furnish the paint at \$2.50 per gallon.

This will be the first time the hospital has been painted since it was remodeled for a hospital during the world war when local citizens contributed to it fearing there might be a scarcity of physicians and knowing of the accidents and fatalities that occur in saw mills and mill camps when the patients had to be taken miles to a hospital. It is the hope and ambition of all concerned with the hospital to build a new hospital large enough to serve all needs at all times.

The hospital has been a great help for this entire district, taking care adequately of the needs of the community with several registered nurses always at hand to do their duty.

The hospital is excellently equipped and carefully superintended by Mrs. Mae Day.
