

NORTON'S DEATH INCREASES TOLL IN AUTO CRASH

Woodburn—Joy Norton, 25, son of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Norton, who reside four miles east of Woodburn, died at the Oregon City hospital at 4 o'clock Friday afternoon of pneumonia. Norton was injured in an accident on the highway last Friday when a truck in which he was riding collided with a car, and he was taken to the hospital. While his injuries were considered serious he was making good progress towards recovery until pneumonia set in, causing his death. He was a graduate of Woodburn high school of the class of 1928 and had many friends in this vicinity. Besides his parents he leaves two brothers, Clifford and Lester. One brother, Everett, died during the war. Funeral arrangements have not been completed. Four other people were almost instantly killed and their bodies cremated when the truck, driven by Howard Magnuson, of Woodburn, crashed. Magnuson is being held in charge of involuntary manslaughter as a result of the accident.
