

WILLAMINA HAS NEW BUILDINGS; OTHERS COMING

Willamina—A community social hall, occupying the whole of the large basement of the Methodist Episcopal church in this city, has just been completed. The main room is 36x38 feet in size, and there are two smaller rooms 18x14 feet each, one of which will be used as a kitchenette and the other as a club room by the Camp Fire Girls.

While the improvements would have cost greatly in excess of \$500, had the work been let by contract, all materials were donated by local mills and lumber yards, and the labor was performed by individuals and organizations free of charge. It is considered remarkable that no cash outlay was required.

Plans are now being formed for dedication of the social hall, to take place sometime this summer, so that the hall may be ready to accommodate social affairs by fall.

Willamina—Announcement has just been made that a temporary building to accommodate approximately 40 students the ensuing term, will be erected at once on the site of the Junior High school, 22 miles east of this city. Plans for the new college, which will cost in excess of \$400,000, have been completed for sometime, but actual construction of the permanent buildings will not be started this year, it was intimated. The temporary school building will be 200 feet in length, with wings, providing class rooms and chapel. The actual work will be started not later than July 1st, it was said, and the building will be ready for occupancy when the school term opens early in August.

PIONEER WOMAN WILL TAKE PART IN JULY RODEO

Molalla—Mrs. Mary A. Brown, a pioneer, will be the guest of the Molalla Buckaroo association at its annual show this year held July 2, 4 and 5.

Born in Umpqua, Douglas county in 1852, she was married to W. C. Brown in 1871 at Eugene. They started on the hazardous trail to eastern Oregon in 1874 taking a small band of sheep with them. Enroute they had several encounters with hostile Indians but finally after three months on the trail managed to reach Farewell Bend, now known as Bend, Ore., on the Deschutes river where they made their camp and remained awhile. Later they went to Rock creek and took up a homestead known as Ghost camp.

The country was full of Indians at that time and finally during the Indian excitement in 1878 Mrs. Brown was forced to leave her home and flee with four small children by a horse and wagon to The Dalles. The trip from Rock Creek to The Dalles was a nightmare for a lone woman with four small children beset on all sides by Indians on the warpath. From The Dalles she took the boat to Portland and then went to Creswell where her folks were.

At 79 years of age Mrs. Brown is healthy and vigorous. She takes care of her own garden and only three weeks ago took an eight mile horseback ride with her daughter to visit some neighboring ranchers. She has especially requested the association that she be allowed to ride in the daily Buckaroo parades and is bringing her own horse and saddle down from Concord, to use. Visitors to the Molalla Buckaroo will have the opportunity of seeing this 79 year old pioneer riding right up amongst the Buckeroos like she did in the old days.
