

STATE CHRISTIAN CONVENTION OPENS WEDNESDAY

TURNER IS HOST TO CHURCH FOLK ON WEDNESDAY

Turner—The annual convention of the Christian churches of Oregon convenes Wednesday evening for a five-day session at the Turner Christian Tabernacle, continuing over the following Sunday, when the state Christian young people conference will begin July 6. Rev. C. F. Swander of Portland, state evangelist, announces that this will be one of the most successful sessions in the 79 years of progress for disciples of Christ.

Four speakers of wide renown in the church will be present in contribute to the state program, including Rev. Jesse M. Bader of Indianapolis, national secretary of evangelism for the disciples of Christ, Rev. George P. Bradford of Kansas City, Mo., who has made an intensive study of "Christian Stewardship," will speak once each day during the convention. Miss Joy Taylor of Indianapolis, chief of staff of the missionary education board, and the Rev. Hugh Williams, missionary to South America, will conduct conferences daily and deliver addresses throughout the session.

Rev. D. J. Howe, pastor of the First Christian church at Salem, is president of the Oregon Christian missionary convention and will preside at all general sessions. Mrs. Thomas Baily of Eugene, president of the state missionary federation, will preside over the missionary conference, and Miss Katherine Ryker of Portland, will be in charge of the young people's conference. Rev. Claude Neely, director of music and assistant pastor of the First Christian church in Portland, will conduct the music, with Miss Lucille Messer of Portland, as convention pianist.

The usual camping privileges will prevail and in addition, rooms may be obtained at the lodge, and in private homes in Turner. The restaurant will be in charge of the women of the Court Street Christian church, in Salem. Thursday evening the Ladies' Aid society of the Turner Christian church will sponsor the annual state missionary banquet in the local Christian church, and as usual, will be one of the interesting features of the state gathering. A complete program of the convention schedule will be announced within a day or two.

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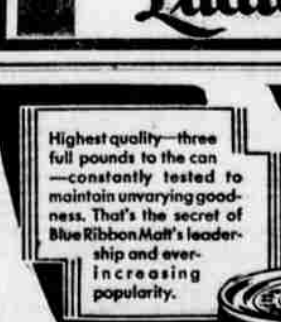
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Divorce Granted In Dallas Action

CONTENTED COW TO HAVE RADIO

Woodburn—One of the largest and most modern dairy barns in Marion is just being completed on the farm of John Fick near St. Paul by Hughes Brothers, contractors and builders of Woodburn. The building is 36x96 feet, with concrete floor and contains stalls for 48 head of cows. It is equipped with individual water fountains, electric lights, electric ventilating system and the milk will be piped direct from the electric milking machines to the milk house, untouched by hand.

An unusual feature will be the installation of an up-to-date radio in the barn which will insure contented cows. The radio is primarily for the benefit of the owner

STATE HISTORY TO BE RECALLED

Champoeg—Champoeg will observe two historical dates in Oregon history this week.

July 4th, 1843 at Champoeg, Rev. Gustavus Hines delivered the first Fourth of July oration in what is now the state of Oregon. This year Senator Jay Upton will be the orator of the day with Senator W. C. Burke of Yamhill county presiding. Sunday will be judiciary day,

commemorating the events which took place at Champoeg July 5, 1843. Judge George Rosaman will be the principal speaker with Mrs. Isaac Lee Patterson presiding. On this date 88 years ago, there were created four districts which later were called counties. They were Tawley, Yamhill, Clackamas and Champoeg. The first named, in 1849 was changed to Washington, named by Col. Joe Meek after Washington county, Va., where he was born, and Champoeg county was changed to Marion on September 3, 1849. These four counties will be represented on Sunday's program at Champoeg. Other historical happenings will be recalled.
