

DALLAS VOTES ON WATER BOND ISSUE THIS FALL

COUNCIL ACTS UPON PURCHASE OF CITY PLANT

Dallas—The city council at their regular meeting Monday evening gave its unanimous support to an ordinance which will bring before the voters the question of whether the city will, or will not, purchase the water system which at the present time supplies the city with water for domestic and fire protection purposes.

The ordinance is an amendment to the existing one and calls for a bond issue of \$120,000 to finance the deal. The date of the special election has been set for September 8.

The water system has been operated since May 24, 1903 by H. V. Gates. On September 17 an ordinance, No. 23, providing for the supply of water to the city and contracting with H. V. Gates for this purpose and providing payment of \$12,000 to Gates, his successors and assigns for a period of 20 years or until termination by agreement of the contracting parties and payment for said plant was adopted by the council and received the mayor's approval Sept. 24, 1902. On Sept. 5, 1927, a resolution was passed providing for the valuation of the water works plant and the taking over of same. This resolution received the mayor's approval on the same day.

Failing to reach an agreement each party selected an arbitrator and June 15 of this year the arbitrators submitted their award setting the value at \$127,707.52. Deducting the sum of \$12,707 already paid by the city brought the valuation down to \$115,000. Extensions, additions, and betterments since September, 1927, up to June 8, 1931 were set at \$5,000, making the total \$120,000. This sum does not include stores or supplies on hand at present time and which are the property of Gates.

The award was acceptable to both parties and as such goes before the voters. The amendment provides for the creation of a water commission of five members. These will be named by the mayor subject to the approval of the council. The initial terms will range from one to five years and thereafter for a full term. The commission is empowered to select a manager and will meet at least once a month. They will be required to file a report every quarter on the following dates, January 15, April 15, July 15 and October 15.

Other business coming before the council included the monthly report of the city treasurer, the quarterly report of the city auditor which was referred to the finance committee.

On a motion by councilman Dalton it was decided to send a letter to Foster & Kleiser, asking that they refrain from erecting a sign in North Dallas just west of the new road because of obstructing the view which is afforded motorists as they enter Dallas.
