

PETERSON ALLOWS ONLY THREE HITS, FANS 13 MEN

VISITORS CAN'T SOLVE HURLER'S SIZZLING HOOKS

Allowing only three hits, one of them doubtful, and striking out 13 men, Andy Peterson added one more to his long list of stellar performances when the Salem Senators defeated Harry Compton's Athletics of Portland Sunday to a score of 4 to 0.

It was one of the best games of the season, and the score would have been 1 to 0 had it not been for Catcher Fleskes' throw to third in the second inning when he hit Louis Girod on the shoulder, the ball bounding into the field and allowing L. Girod, Adolph and Foreman all to score on top of Olinger's earned run.

Drake for the Comptons pitched excellent ball, and while he struck out only two men he allowed only seven hits. Three were bunched in the second.

LIMPING GIANTS TAKE TWO FROM PHILLIE TEAM

The new and less capricious ball that has given major league pitchers a new lease on life this season evidently is losing its magic qualities as the sun beams stronger and the batters begin to reach their top form. The doctored sphere was forced to take a lusty beating over the week end.

Hitting predominated in almost every instance Sunday as 14 contests were unrecited in the two circuits, including a set of double-headers in the National. Only ten pitchers out of 28 who started were able to go the distance. Thirty runs crossed the plate in one tilt, 21 in another and 14 in a third.

The Chicago Cubs and St. Louis Cardinals gave the day's most boisterous exhibition in the second game of their pair, the Cards pounding six Cub pitchers for 21 hits and a 17 to 13 victory. Chicago captured the first tilt, largely the result of homers by Haack Wilson and Hazen Cuyler.

The crippled New York Giants took two free-hitting contests from the Phillies, 13 to 6 and 9 to 4, to pick up a full game on the cards. Beryl and Heving held the Phils to eight hits in the first, while Freddie Fitzsimmons allowed only six in the nightcap. Frank Hogan hit two homers in the first game and Mel Ott a pair in the second.

Cincinnati's last place Reds came back after five straight defeats to sweep their holiday bill with the Pittsburgh Pirates 14 to 7, in the opener, and 6 to 5 in the 11 inning nightcap.
