Toronto (AP)—Walter Hager of Detroit, was a slight favorite in the betting Monday to defeat Percy Alliss, the Englishman from Berlin, in their 36-hole play off Tuesday for the Canadian open golf championship.

The play-off was necessitated Saturday when Hager and Alliss ended the regulation 72 holes in a deadlock with aggregates of 282 strokes each. Alliss took a rest from golf Sunday but Hager journeyed to Buffalo where he teamed with Tommy Armour, British open champion, to defeat Hamilton Gardner and Duane Tower, 4 and 3, in an exhibition match.

BIG BILL TILDEN HAS MANY TITLES

New York (AP)—Just as though he needed the title to prove himself the world's greatest player, Big Bill Tilden set about to win the national professional tennis championship, and won. So now he has won everything.

In the final match against his most earnest and least-loved foe, Vincent Richards, the scores of 7-5, 6-2, 6-1, were fair indications of the match itself.

Seven times United States singles champion, thrice winner at Wimbledon, a Davis cup victor more times than he may care to recall, Tilden's new title, however coveted, is only one of a ponderous collection.
