Through Dr. Hans Luther, president of the Reichsbank, Germany obtained support of the world bank. In the background is Adolf Hitler, leader of the national socialists, whose strength at the polls last November has been cited in many quarters as the reason for withdrawal of foreign capital from Germany.

FIRST GRAIN CROP DELIVERIES START

Sheridan—The first of the 1931 grain crop of the Sheridan and Bellevue district was delivered the past week and Henry Sundburg of Sheridan claims the credit for the first delivery. This was oats and vetch and when separated, the vetch will bring two and three-quarters cents per pound. The crop is light over the district around Sheridan.

Jake Duerst of the Bellevue district has just cut a bumper crop of white clover, which, it is reported, will when sold pay for the ground it is planted on. Combining will begin in many wheat fields this week. Many fields have already been cut with the binder and are shocked and awaiting threshing. The best estimate of the wheat yield indicates an average of probably 25 to 30 bushels per acre. A few fields are reported as promising a yield of 50 bushels.

NOVITIATE AT SHERIDAN HAS OPENING SOON

Sheridan—Workers are pushing the work on the Sheridan Novitiate at Paradise View and indications point to a completion of the building, which is being erected for present use, before the scheduled time, July 25.

The details of the present building have been worked out with the firm of Dougan-Reverman, Inc., of Portland and Father Nathaniel Purcell, supervisor at Paradise View farm, who was an architect before he entered the priesthood. Reverman is in actual charge of the construction. This building, which is temporary, contains 11,000 square feet of floor space and will house the students while the main stands on the ridge of the hill, 900 feet above the surrounding valleys and its wings command a magnificent view.

The temporary building will be converted later into a gymnasium or recreational building. The partitions installed for rooms are temporary and will be removed as soon as the permanent building is ready. The supply of water for the Novitiate has been a paramount issue in the selection of the Paradise View site for the college and for a time stood in the way of early construction work. An attempt was made to secure drinking water from the Sheridan water supply. The water problem has not been fully solved but a well has been drilled at the foot of the hill and if this fails to meet all the requirements for water a main will be built to the Yanhill River and water pumped to the reservoir.

About 60 boys are expected the latter part of this month for the opening of school work August 2. They come from Washington, Montana, Idaho and Oregon and their work will be that beyond the high school.
