CASCADE ROAD BOOSTERS ARE AFTER PROJECT

Molalla—Gordon J. Taylor of Molalla, secretary of the Cascade highway association, was in Salem Thursday and attended a meeting of the county courts of Clackamas, Marion, Linn and Lane counties. There was a luncheon meeting in the Elks Temple at the noon hour.

The question of asking the highway commission to name the Cascade highway as a secondary highway under the new law was under discussion. It was unanimously agreed to ask the highway commission to place the Cascade highway on their system as a secondary highway. Dr. P. A. Loar of Silverton, who is president of the Cascade highway association, and Taylor brought the matter before the commission. This was the first application before the highway commission under the new law.

This highway will connect with the super highway at Oregon City and go approximately through Molalla, Silverton, Stayton, Scio, Lebanon, Brownsville, Coburg, Springfield and Eugene.

This is the old territorial road and the first road which was built into Southern Oregon. This distance from Oregon City to Springfield and Eugene will be shortened considerably by the route.

A large delegation was in attendance at the meeting from Silverton and all the towns along the route. Included in county courts present were Clackamas Judge C. W. Kruse, Commissioners R. A.
