

CLACKAMAS RELIGIOUS RALLY TO BE HELD SUNDAY

CANYON CREEK SELECTED FOR ANNUAL EVENT

Molalla—The Clackamas county council of religious education will hold its annual rally Sunday at the Canyon Creek park at Colton.

In the morning at 10 o'clock the Molalla band will play; 10:15, song service led by Harold Horner of Springfield; 10:30, reading of letters and prayer; 10:35, classes assigned by E. A. Steiber, superintendent of the Methodist Episcopal Sunday school of Oregon City; 11:00, music by the Rural Dell chorus; 11:15, appointment of committees; 12:00, basket dinner with coffee served free, bring cups; 1:30, band music and teachers' conference; 1:50, song service; 2:00, chalk talk, "Let the Blackboard Speak the Gospel," by Rev. George M. Taylor of Albany college; 2:30, solo, Martin Berglund; 2:35 address, Rev. E. C. Farnham, D. D., executive secretary of the Portland council of churches; 3:00, male quartet consisting of Frank Aldredge, Milton Essig, William Essig, Charles Steiner; closing services, Edward Shearer is president and Quylene Aldredge is secretary. The executive committee consists of J. O. Staats of Molalla; James Hamilton, Estacada; Otto Linan of Beavercreek; G. O. Schieve of Milwaukie and A. F. Anderson of Milwaukie.

During the week of August 9 to 16 inclusive there will be a teachers' training institute under the auspices of the Clackamas county council of religious education held at the Advent Christian church at Colton. This is for the purpose of helping the Sunday school teachers of Clackamas county to do more efficient work in their various fields in building up their local Bible schools and churches.

Rev. O. R. Jenks, president of the Aurora college, Aurora, Ill., who is an accredited instructor of the National Council of Religious Education, will be the instructor in the classes. Rev. Stanley H. Perry, dean of the Aurora college, will assist.

This is the first time any thing of this sort has been tried out here. The subjects taken up are: a study of the pupil, the principles of teaching, the Old Testament, the message and program of Christian religion, young people's materials and methods, studies in the prophets. This course is outlined by the international council of religious education and those who take the course will be given credits by the national council.

There is a registration fee of \$1. Tents and bed springs may be rented and meals will be served. To those who wish to bring their camping equipment, the camping and fuel will be free.
