RELISH GELATIN SALAD
1 package lemon flavored gelatin
1 cup boiling water
2 cups boiling water
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon paprika
2 1/2 cups chopped raw carrot
1 cup chopped cabbage
2 tablespoons chopped green peppers
Pour water over gelatin mixture and stir until dissolved. Pour into mold and chill until stiff. Unmold carefully on lettuce and surround with salad dressing.

SALAD DRESSING
(For fruit, fish or vegetable salads)
4 egg yolks
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon paprika
1 teaspoon dry mustard
4 tablespoons flour
1/2 cup sugar
2 1/2 cups vinegar
1/2 cup water
2 tablespoons sour cream
Beat yolks and add dry ingredients. Blend and add rest of ingredients. Cook in double boiler until thick and creamy. Stir frequently. When dressing is creamy beat well and cool.

PEACH TARTS
2 cups flour
1 teaspoon salt
2 1/2 cups cold water
2 1/2 cups flour
2 1/2 cups cold water
Mix flour and salt. Cut in with knife. Mix with knife, slowly add water. When stiff dough forms, divide into six pieces, roll out each piece and fit into individual tarts.
