CLARK FILES SUIT TO GET JUDGMENT

Dallas—Robert Clark has filed suit in the circuit court against Mrs. Delano Bell and Mrs. S. C. Salander. In the plaintiff states that he instituted the action May 24, 1929 for the sum of \$245 in payment for work performed with the sum of \$65 as attorneys fees. On November 1, 1929 the defendant filed answer in which every allegation was denied. Proceedings were transferred to the Marion county court in June, next year, where plaintiff was given judgment with interest at 6 per cent plus \$65 attorney's fees and \$18 costs. No part of the judgment has yet been paid. On May 12, 1931 the plaintiff issued execution to the sheriff of Polk county but no property could be located in the county which was subject to the above and a certificate to that effect was returned by the officer. Plaintiff claims that at the time when he was awarded judgment the defendant was the owner in fee simple of a number of pieces of real property in Polk county which she deeded to Mrs. S. C. Salander for the express purpose of preventing the plaintiff from satisfying his judgment, that no consideration was involved as far as Mrs. Salander was concerned and that she accepted same with the full knowledge of the circumstances.
