Norton, who was for 20 years reclusive editor of the Chicago Tribune and who has recently published a book, "Church and Newspaper." Her daughter is the wife of the superintendent of the Delhi district, northwest India conference, the Rev. S. W. Glimes and lives in the capital of India.

By reason of her wide acquaintance in India, Mrs. Norton is enabled to keep informed regarding the recent political movements in that disturbed country which is undergoing one of the greatest revolutions in history. While in India, Dr. and Mrs. Norton spent three days with Mahatma Gandhi, the nationalist leader and one of the recognized great men of the world. They also met many prominent associates of Mr. Gandhi. In speaking Mrs. Norton will give first hand information on these vital subjects.
