

LIGHTING SYSTEM COMPLETED FOR FOOTBALL FIELD

ADJUSTING OF BIG REFLECTORS FINISHES WORK

A glow which could be seen for miles and which caused persons living in the outlying districts of the city to believe that a fire was raging in the downtown section Monday night was simply advance notice that the first night football game ever to be held in Salem would soon be staged. Completing the work of connecting the lighting system of Sweetland field two days ahead of time, the main switch was thrown Monday evening for the first time while the reflectors were adjusted to proper focus. Motorists who circled the campus Monday evening report the illumination was away beyond expectations.

Although ticket sales for the big benefit game between Willamette and Columbia scheduled for next Friday night at 8 o'clock are being pushed over Polk and Marion counties by Cascade area council Boy Scouts of America, many persons are said to be holding off because they fear Columbia will not be able to furnish sufficient opposition to make a good contest. This is far from being the facts in the matter, Coach Keene states, since the Irish, coached by Gene Murphy, are fast and play a tricky brand of ball. The school in addition to having a squad of varsity caliber, supports a team which plays in high school circles.

At a meeting held Monday night by those backing the movement to have a record-breaking crowd on hand Friday evening when the referee blows the first blast from his whistle, it was revealed that a big football-ticket office will be located at the intersection of Liberty and State streets Tuesday. Both reserved seats and general admission tickets can be obtained from there.

Building of substantial bleacher seats at either end of Sweetland field is being rushed by a corps of carpenters. With the completion of these seats and with the placing of gymnasium seats along the south side of the field, comfortable places for all who attend the big game have been assured.

MAD PLAY SENT TO PASTURE BY RACE STEWARDS

Collinsville, Ill. (AP)—Mad Play, famous race horse of other years, will run in no more cheap plater races, at least at Fairmount park.

The entry clerk Tuesday had this ruling from the stewards:

"Re: entry of Mad Play for future races.
"He has kept the faith."
"Winner of approximately \$136,000 in purses while racing under the colors of Harry P. Sinclair's Rancho stable, old Mad Play, under new owners, was entered Saturday in the last race on the program, with victory worth only \$450 to the winner."

Twelve horses went to the post. Mad Play could get no farther to the front than fourth, and he passed the judges' stand with six horses ahead of him. As he passed the stand he went lame.

The stewards knew Mad Play deserved pleasant pasture, but they couldn't arbitrarily order the horse to pasture. They could and did, however, rule that the entry clerk reject entry of Mad Play for future races.

It was reported at the track Tuesday that the present owners plan to turn Mad Play out to pasture.

LEW FONSECA

Chicago (AP)—Lew Fonseca, outfielder of the Chicago White Sox of the American league, has been named manager to succeed Donie Bush, who resigned last week.

Fonseca signed a two year contract, similar to that held by Bush, which explained that the reason he did not seek to renew his contract was that he felt he had a better future if he went elsewhere.

The Cleveland Indians sent Fonseca to the White Sox during the last season in a trade for Willie Kamm, third baseman. Fonseca was the leading American league batter in 1929.

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BEARCATS SHOW SPIRIT LACKING SAYS MR. KEENE

"Here we are with the best bunch of prospects on our hands in years, yet if the men don't snap into it and put a little zip into their actions, I'm afraid of what will happen next Friday night when Columbia comes here." Such was the prediction late Monday of Coach Keene who stopped long enough from supervising the erection of bleacher seats around Sweetland field, instructing one of his backfield men where he could get an appliance for the injured leg, consulting with the president of the student body, and conferring with several persons over the telephone in regard to various details of the first night game to be played in Salem, to answer a few questions of an inquisitive news chaser.

"They looked like a bunch of sheep out there last Friday when we had that scrimmage. Half the time the ball carriers were stopping when they had made five yards instead of pulling out and making some real yardage."

"Spec" brightened up considerably, however, when several of his players were mentioned, in spite of the fact that his nose was becoming sore from excessive blowing due to a cold.

"We will move Mahan up to first string quarterback," the coach said. "He looked good out there and I believe he will put a lot of life into the squad. He will stay there until some other player shows me that he is entitled to the position."

Ross has been shifted to the post of blocking half, a position which should fit him well. Calling signals apparently takes away some of the effectiveness of Ross, the coach states.

Playing behind the line with Mahan and Ross will be Walt Erickson and Louie Johnson.

Another of the bright spots in blanket of gloom is the work of Leo Kaiser at end. Always a little slow to start, Coach Keene says he is developing rapidly, especially with his blocking.

Coach Keene introduced what he called "formation B" to his players last week but has had to abandon

it. It took too much individual blocking the coach says and apparently the team was not ready for it.

"We will go ahead and learn what few plays we have and make the best showing possible," the Bearcat mentor said as he concluded the interview by anxiously inquiring if anybody thought it was going to rain.

Hazel Green—Walter Rutherford has returned to his home after spending the past week at Breitenbush springs where he underwent the hot mineral bath treatments for inflammatory rheumatism with which he has been suffering for the past month. "Southern California has two alternate backfields and every man in them is equally good," O'Brien said when asked if Mohler was not the outstanding man on the team.
