Douglas, county health officer. There have been no diphtheria cases here since mid-summer. Dr. Douglas stated that it was almost impossible to guard against such scattering cases of diphtheria and the only protection, provided or school children would have against such cases is toxoid immunization. All parents are invited to bring their children to the clinics at the health department Saturday mornings from 8:30 to 10 o'clock for diphtheria immunization treatments.

MOTT TELLS OF DUBIOUS TACTICS OF RACKETEERS

How Oregon residents have been mulcted of millions of dollars in the last 10 years through the operations of financial racketeers, chiefly in the building and loan industry, was told the Klamath club Tuesday noon by James Mott, state corporation commissioner. In this connection he said that the officers or directors got control of the companies for the sole purpose of scuttling the business through substitution of worthless for liquid assets, mainly through the medium of holding companies. Legally operated with ordinary intelligence on the part of directors, it is impossible for a building and loan company to fail, so many are the safeguards thrown about the company by law in protection to the investors, Mott asserted.

"Financial racketeering is the system by which a person or persons, pretending to sell something to the public, give little or nothing in return," Mott stated. "This is done with knowledge upon the part of the seller that the security offered is of little or no value and the business essentially conducted for the personal profit of the operator or operators."

Mott stated that the judgment of a corporation or securities commissioner is not always infallible, but he should have enough sense to know whether or not a racket is being carried on as he is in position to have full facts concerning operations at all times. He expressed the hope that in a reasonable early period he would be able to announce that all such concerns a banker to ascertain what is the market value. Legitimate securities may eventually prove worthless through mismanagement or because of their strictly speculative nature, he said.

SEEK TO HALT COLLECTION OF PROPERTY TAX

Fifty members of the Marion County Tax Equalization league's executive board voted authority to A. C. Geer, tax audit committee chairman, to proceed with a test case to halt the collection of real property taxes in the state of Oregon.

The members of the board, meeting Monday afternoon in the Salem chamber of commerce auditorium, indicated they will contend that real property taxes as currently levied, are unconstitutional on the grounds of unfair distribution of the tax load.

The real property, they contend carries 88 per cent of the tax load while it represents but 26 per cent of the wealth of the state.

The county league was organized here last spring under the leadership of Henry Zorn, farmer of the Aurora district. Zorn's position as county chairman and also as a member of Governor Meier's state organization came up for considerable discussion, but no action was taken by the county executive board.

A committee of five was named to confer with members of the county court relative to matters of economical administration of county business. The members of the committee are Ed Fortier, Silverton; L. S. Lambert, Stayton; W. H. Stevens, Corvallis; W. A. Jones, Macleay; and A. C. Geer, Macleay.

The next meeting of the body was set for Monday, November 9.

Treats Tots Then Dies by His Own Hand

Denver, Colo., (AP)—A few small coins, jingling in the pocket of Thomas Polger, jobless garage worker, as his daughters climbed on his knee Monday night.

"Papa is going to give you a surprise," he told them. "What would you like most?"

"Ice cream," chorused June, 10, and Marjorie, 8, and they clapped their hands in glee. Treats had been scarce in their lives.

"Ice cream it shall be," said Polger, "and if there's any change left, buy papa a cigar."

He gave them the coins—his last. Happily the children accompanied by their mother, went to a corner store for ice cream. When they returned 10 minutes later they found Polger dead. He had shot himself with an old hunting rifle. Mrs. Polger said he had been out of work for months and that all of their meager property had been disposed of. Last week Polger attempted to have himself arrested by "confessing" several crimes in an effort to have his family cared for.

DETROIT SCHOOL REMAINS UNSPOTTED

When County Superintendent Fulkerson and the new rural supervisor Wayne D. Harding visited the Detroit school Monday they found that for the seventh year the pupils of that school have maintained the record of keeping their school home unmarked by markings, writings or pictures. This is the only school in the county with such a record.

While the school this year has 38 pupils, many of them new ones, the new pupils have taken up the spirit of the classes for seven years and duly impressed by the older pupils have refrained from marking the building in any manner.

Mrs. Fulkerson states that Detroit has the best play shed in the county with a portion partitioned off for younger children and the entire shed is floored.

MILITIA CALLED TO OUST HUEY LONG

Baton Rouge, La., (AP)—The Baton Rouge unit of the national guard was ordered out at 2:45 p.m. Tuesday, shortly after Lieutenant Governor Paul N. Cyr, had taken the oath as governor at Shreveport to challenge the right of Governor Huey P. Long to continue as chief executive.

Cyr, after being apprised of Cyr's action, left New Orleans hurriedly by automobile and sped toward the capital.

The national guard unit, infantry company A, consisting of between 50 and 60 men, was ordered to assemble on the community club grounds in the center of the city.

SOVIET ORGAN IBBES HOOVER AS SAVIOR

Moscow (AP)—The newspaper Izvestia poked ridicule in a long editorial Monday at President Hoover's new proposal to cope with the economic dislocation.

NO MONEY IN TREASURY TO PAY REFUNDS

What to use for money? That is the question which is bothering Rufus Holman, state treasurer, as much if not more than the average run of private citizens these days. The state treasury has been nearly empty for some time.

The temporary lack of money, not unusual of recent years at this particular season, is made particularly embarrassing now by the fact that the state has a bill of \$894,458.35, plus nearly \$35,000 in interest charges.

After the act had been declared invalid by the state supreme court in 1931, the state legislature in authorizing the state tax commission to attempt an appeal to the federal supreme court directed that in event the appeal should fail, the secretary of state should draw warrants against the general fund for the amount of the state payments collected.

Monday the federal supreme court formally declined to review the decision of the state court and Tuesday Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state, was providing to his force to work at drawing funds from the list of 18,000 taxpayers certified to him by the tax commission. Hoss estimates that it will require his office staff working at its average speed, nearly two months to get the warrants all out, and it was estimated during the legislature when considering the refund measure that the state would run around \$20,000.

Hoss has no alternative but to immediately draw the warrants when become due and payable when presented to the treasurer. If not paid for lack of funds when presented they are so endorsed and commence to bear interest at 6 per cent from the date of endorsement.

Holman has not a cent in the general fund with which to pay the warrants. Repayment of money borrowed from the highway funds so that the October 1 division of the automobile license fee money between the state and the counties could be made has left the cupboard bare.

Of course, there still remains the possibility of issuing a temporary deficiency certificate for a million dollars or whatever amount is needed and borrowing the money for a time. But Holman and Governor Meier have publicly said that they do not like that way of doing business and have criticized Hoss and the members of the board of control for resorting to this relief in past financial emergencies.

Perhaps, after all, Mr. and Mrs. taxpayer are not going to get those refunds right away.

HAWAIIAN YOUTH GUEST AT PORTLAND

Wilbert Choi, 18, former president of the Hawaiian Association of the Future Farmers of America, here Tuesday was the guest of honor of 500 Smith-Hughes agricultural students at Portland October 23. It was announced here Tuesday, Smith-Hughes students will be present from five northwestern states during the Pacific International Livestock show.

Choi will remain in Oregon, Earl Cooley of the state department of vocational education announced, until November 10 at which time he will leave with two other representatives of agricultural students for the National Congress of Future Farmers of America at Kansas City.

Kenneth Pettibone, Corvallis, former president of the Oregon association, recently visited the Hawaiian Islands. Choi will visit many high schools in the state during his stay.

LURED TO VACANT HOUSE AND ROBBED

Portland (AP)—Joe Schnitzer, bail bondsman, told police Tuesday he had been lured to a vacant residence, stripped of his clothing, bound, and robbed of \$30 in cash and jewelry valued at \$400, by a man who telephoned him to visit the house to discuss a \$5000 jail bond.

When Schnitzer entered the house, the man drew a revolver and demanded the bondsman's money. Schnitzer gave him all he had but the gunman insisted that Schnitzer had \$5000 secreted in his clothing. He proceeded to strip the bondsman.

Police found the house deserted. The owner told them the furnished residence had been vacant since last Friday when the family living there moved to California.

WHEAT POOL SKINS FARMERS OF DOMINION

Houston, Tex., (AP)—Asher Howard, Winnipeg grain dealer, declared Tuesday "the Canadian wheat pool had cost farmers of western Canada not less than \$100,000,000."

He predicted that the "farm board experiment will cost tax-payers of the United States not less than \$300,000,000."

Howard addressed the annual convention of the National Grain and Feed Dealers' association.

"The wheat pool operated in Canada eight years and in not a single year did the pool farmer receive as much for his wheat as the non-pool farmer," Howard declared.

"Not only that, but the pool farmer only received about two-thirds of the value of his wheat when he marketed it, and 140,000 farmers in western Canada are still waiting for the other one-third of the 1928 crop and all the crops they have marketed since."

"The Canadian pool used the printer's ink and the radio and the platform for eight years to denounce the system to which they have now returned."

"The farm board in this country undertook to eliminate speculation and they became the greatest speculative force that ever operated in grain and cotton. They undertook to stabilize the ocean waves. They prevented surpluses by increasing surpluses. They made orderly marketing disorderly."

Bend, Ore., (AP)—Angered because his 21-year-old wife would not return to him, Perry E. Kernan of Oakland, Cal., Monday night attempted to kill the girl and her mother and then shot himself to death.

Mrs. Kernan's mother, Mrs. M. M. Senn, suffered two wounds in beating Kernan off as he attacked the two women with a long-bladed knife. He left and returned with a rifle. The women shielded the Kernans' two small children and barricaded the door. Kernan then turned the rifle on himself.

Besides his widow and two children Kernan is survived by his father, O. L. Kernan of Oakland, and a brother, Ed Kernan of Klamath Falls.

DIRIGIBLE AKRON ON SPEED TEST

Akron, O., (AP)—Eight 560-horsepower engines were driving the U. S. Navy dirigible Akron, Oct. 12, as it made its first speed test.
