Suver—The Suver grange held a meeting in the Woodman hall with a very good attendance. After the regular business meeting a program was given.

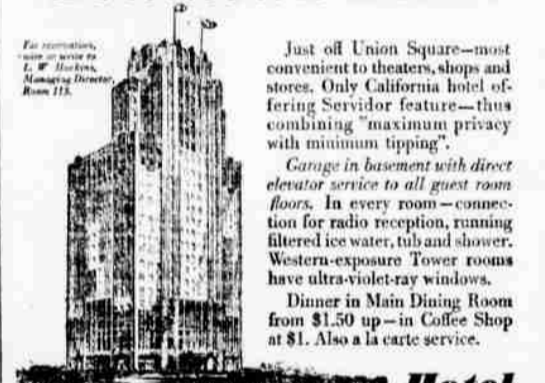
### Mrs. Taylor Speaks Before Garden Club
