San Francisco (AP)—Posted alongside latest reports of Chinese-Japanese clashes in Manchuria, bulletins calling on young Chinese to join in the formation of a "flying legion," ready for service in any part of the world, were sources of excitement in Chinatown here Friday.

San Quentin, Cal. (AP)—Pedro Magway, 40-year-old Filipino, was hanged here Friday on a stand of Alejandro Plisgan, 40, near Fresno two years ago. Both were ranch hands.

CONTRACT LET FOR ROSEBURG MAP

Roseburg, Ore. (AP)—The first step toward actual construction by the federal government of the \$2,000,000 northwest national soldiers' home to be located at Roseburg, was announced Friday in the award of a contract to Ben B. Irving, Roseburg engineer, for preparation of a topographical map of the 407-acre tract on which the institution will be built.

Col. William Radcliff of the United States board of hospitalization, recently issued calls for bids for preparation of this map. Irving, a federal mineral surveyor in this district, was notified Friday of the acceptance of his proposal.

Portland, Ore. (AP)—All convicted drunken drivers in Portland hereafter will have their fingerprints, their photographs and their records on file at police headquarters.

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DRUGGIST KILLS YOUNG BANDIT

Portland (AP)—James Keller, 23, one of three bandits who attempted to hold up the Cunningham Pharmacy on Milwaukee street Thursday night, was shot and killed by James Cunningham, 56 year old veteran of the Spanish-American war, his proprietor, during a shooting duel between the holdup men and Cunningham.

As Henry Cunningham, 25 year old son, turned to get a bottle of hair tonic, ordered by one of the bandits, from the shelf, the muzzle of a gun was placed against his ribs. He was then forced to the rear of his store where another robber had already gone.

In the rear of the store James Cunningham was sitting in a chair reading "Four Murders in Thirty Minutes," an article about a recent murder in Michigan. Keller, who was the first to enter the rear room, ordered the elder Cunningham to "stick 'em up." As Cunningham rose from his chair, which was behind a table where Keller stood, he pulled a .38-caliber revolver from his front pocket and fired from the hip, the bullet striking Keller.

Keller and his companion both returned the fire, bullets flying at random in the small room. In the exchange James Cunningham received powder burns high up on the left side of his head.

A revolver similar to the one which Cunningham used in bringing down Keller was lying on a stand nearby. Keller's companion grabbed this, and as both bandits retreated to the front entrance of the store, the guns continued to bark. Just as Keller rounded a showcase, James Cunningham fired from the door of the rear room, the bullet striking Keller in the head.

The other bandit continued to fire as he ran to the front entrance and dashed out into the street where he joined the third member of the gang. They drove away in what was believed to be a Chevrolet coupe.

Keller's body was taken to the morgue where it was identified by fingerprints. He was known to the police. The last time he was booked was October 14, when he was brought in on a charge of vagrancy and released.

CLOSE REGISTRATION TO VOTERS SATURDAY

Those wishing to vote at the special water bond city election on December 15 have until 5 o'clock Saturday evening to see that their registration is all straight.

If a voter has voted in the last two years, hasn't changed his precinct, or if a woman hasn't changed her name by marriage, such voter, providing he or she has already registered can go to the polls with a pretty clear conscience. But if any of these things have or haven't happened and the voter living in any city precinct wishes to vote at the special election he or she must straighten the matter out at the county clerk's office before 3 o'clock Saturday or the right to vote will be forfeited.

County Clerk Boyer reports a great many changes of addresses already reported along with other things causing voters to be ineligible and he thinks there are probably a great many more such cases.

5000 SALEMITES PETITION FOR PEACE

Fully 5000 Salem citizens will have affixed their signatures to petitions calling upon the United States government to cooperate with other world powers in an effort to curtail armaments by the time they are ready for transmission to headquarters of the National Council for the Prevention of War, in the opinion of Prof. S. B. Laughlin, who, as a Quaker is an advocate of peace, and interested in the disarmament movement. Although not much more than half of the city was covered last Sunday by volunteer petition circulators, approximately 3000 signatures were

secured. Fourteen of the 85 districts were not worked at all owing to a shortage of volunteers. The work of securing signatures will be continued through next Sunday. Very few persons refused to sign the petitions, although one man, who claimed to be a Bible student over a period of 30 years, declared the prophecies precluded any participation in the doing away of war. Another man, a veteran of the Civil war, said he believed in war because it taught young men to be brave.

HEATER MAY BE CANDIDATE

W. A. Heater, who farms extensively northwest of Sublimity on the Silver Creek river road, and who is one of the biggest taxpayers among Marion county farmers, probably will become a candidate for the republican nomination for county commissioner in the primary election of next May.

Mr. Heater was in Salem Thursday and while he does not announce himself positively as a candidate he says that quite a large number of persons have requested him to get into the running, and he admits it is possible that he will ask the voters for a place on the county board of commissioners. The term of Commissioner John Porter of Silverton will expire, and whether he will be a candidate to succeed himself has not been announced.

Mr. Heater is a native of Marion county, son of Dr. P. H. Heater of Silverton who came to Oregon and settled in the Waldo hills in 1852. He says he is a progressive, and that, should he become a candidate and be elected, would have a general policy of economy in behalf of the taxpayers. Mr. Heater has never held a public office. He is credited with having been very successful as a farmer.
