10 Year Old Musical Composer To Hear Own Composition Rendered

Boston (U.P.)—A mite of a miss who celebrated her 10th birthday anniversary last month will sit in Symphony hall Sunday and hear one of her music master. She is Susan "Chiqui" Godoy, daughter of a Porto Rican father and a Yankee mother—a tiny girl with bright brown eyes and long chestnut hair who likes Bach, Haydn, and Beethoven, and at the same time, enjoys pillow fights, hop-scotch, and hide-and-seek.

The composition is variations "Sixtes" (pronounced see-ches). The pianist who will play it as part of a regular classical program is the brilliant young Jesus Maria Sanroma, one time official pianist of the Boston Symphony orchestra. Susan has been his pupil for two years.

Neither of the child's parents is a musician. Yet when three years old Susan displayed an extraordinary aptitude. Perched upon Webster's unbridged, her little legs dangling, she would play simple Spanish tunes with one finger.

Before she started to kindergarten she was composing simple pieces. Today, though her hand can't stretch an octave and her feet are inches short of the pedals, she has half a dozen real compositions to her credit.

Her musical ability has developed so naturally that neither she nor her mother appreciates how unusual it is for a sixth grade pupil to be composing things such as "Sixtes."

REVETMENT TURNS FLOOD

Albany—With the flood water of the Santiam river reaching to within three feet of the revetment work a short distance above the Sanderson's bridge Thursday, the structure turned the water into the channel river and left the river bank undisturbed, it was announced by members of the county court.

This was the first test of the revetment work placed by the county to protect the county road leading to the bridge and adjacent farm property.

The revetment and the wing immediately beyond the revetment work are straightening the swollen current out into the middle of the river, as engineers predicted.

Silverton—Water from the Pudding river and that which drained from the surrounding territory, flowed across the pavement in the bottoms near the covered bridge west of here Friday afternoon, covering the pavement to a depth of nearly six inches for a distance of several hundred feet.
