

WILLAMETTE WINS FROM ALBANY COLLEGE, 25 - 13

BEARCAT SHOCK TROOPS SCORE 3 TOUCHDOWNS

Coach Eric Keene's shock troops proved better scorers than his regulars on frosty Sweetland field Friday night and as a result the Bearcats were able to turn back the Albany Pirates, 25 to 13. The game was a good one to watch, with forward passing, blocked punts and long runs featuring the play. Adamscheck, Pirate backfield man, furnished the main thrill of the evening when he intercepted one of Fred Paul's passes on the Albany 10 yard line and ran the length of the field for a touchdown. A blocked punt with Albany recovering the ball on Willamette's 30 yard mark, was the break which enabled the Pirates to score their other touchdowns.

Bill Ross, playing for the first time for any considerable period in the Bearcat backfield, struck a lot of drive. Time after time he reeled off 8 and 10 yards through the line, with the second string forwards opening up good holes. Credited with having no passing attack worth mentioning, Fred Paul opened up immediately after taking the Albany kickoff and completed two for good yardage before the Pirates could get organized.

Captain Keene showed in an entirely new backfield, new ends and a center at the start of the final period and after about 10 minutes of play Willamette's attack left little to be desired for the final touchdown. After being denied once when Albany intercepted a forward pass and ran the ball back to their own 20, Willamette again took possession of the oval on their own 37 and did not stop until Ross went over for the touchdown. A line plunge failed to gain enough yardage for the extra point.

Following several exchanges of kicks Willamette finally took the ball on the Albany 41. After driving in the Albany defense through a series of line plays, Paul drifted back and shot a perfect pass to Lorenz who had cut through back of the Albany line and leaped unimpeded for a touchdown. Ross kicked the goal.

Paul caught Albany flatfooted with a quick kick after the second period was a few minutes over. The ball finally stopped on the Pirates' 18 yard line. Fred to kick, the Bearcats took the ball on the Albany 46. A pass, Paul to Ingersoll, was good to the Albany 38 while Ross went around right end to the 16 yard stripe. Olson made three through the line, and then Paul flipped another to Ingersoll who ran to the 5 yard line, fell down, rolled to his feet and went over for the third score. The try for extra point was blocked.

Paul juggled the ball for a second while attempting another quick kick and Albany blocked the effort on Willamette's 30. The Pirates immediately started a hard drive with Klockers and Buchanan carrying the ball. Willamette braced momentarily on their own 5 but after three attempts Albany punched Klockers and Buchanan kicked the goal.

The thrill of the evening came shortly after the start of the second half. Albany had fumbled the ball with Willamette recovering on the Pirates' 22. After advancing the ball to the Albany 15, Paul shot a pass into the flat zone and Adamscheck speared it on his own 10 and scampered down the south side of the field for a touchdown. Paul was hit by two Albany players after he had thrown the ball and did not regain his feet until Adamscheck had too much of a lead to be overtaken.

The final Willamette drive started on the Bearcat 48 yard line. Erickson, Johnson, Mahan and Williams took turns at smacking the Albany line and running the short with Walt finally scoring on a end dash around left end. Again the lineback failed to score the extra point.

Albany opened up with an aerial attack but after one had been completed and another knocked down a third was intercepted.
