

HOME RAIDERS CONTINUE ACT AT SILVERTON

Silverton—The large farm home of J. C. Larson on the Scandia road was entered by thieves Saturday evening sometime between 8 and 9:30 o'clock and every one of the seven rooms and the basement were ransacked, with the result that the Larson family lost all their clothing, silverware, a large amount of money, jewelry, bedding, linens, in fact about everything in the home except the dishes and the bare furniture.

Miss Viola Larson, a student in the Pacific Lutheran college at Parkland, Wash., had just arrived home for the Christmas holidays, and brought with her all her wearing apparel, which was missing entirely. Miss Margaret Getz, teacher in the district in which the Larsons live, who was boarding at the Larson home also lost all her clothing, \$150 in money and two suitcases.

The thieves must have carried their loot away in a car as the house is directly on the Salem-Silverton highway, and it was impossible to gain access from tracks left. There seem to have been no indications whatever as to who the marauders were though the county authorities are at work on the case.

Mission Bottom—The home of A. N. Parsons and T. R. Jelders was broken into and robbed Friday evening while the families were at a Christmas program at the school houses.

The house was stripped of dishes, silverware, groceries and clothing. Every item of clothing, including shoes belonging to the little Jelders girls were taken, leaving them with only the clothes they were wearing. Parsons' clothes were thrown out of the closet and left, evidently they were the wrong size to fit the thieves. A fine shotgun, 20 pounds of honey and a quantity of sausage was also taken. Bedding from the downstairs guest room was stolen.

Entrance was gained into the house by breaking the glass in the front door and turning the key that had been left in the lock from the inside.
