

SHRINE CHARITY CONTEST DRAWS HUGE THROG

Kezar Stadium, San Francisco, Jan. 1 (AP)—Makers of gridiron history met Friday in the seventh annual East-West football game.

A roster of 44 players bristling with stars from the east, south, midwest and Pacific coast composed the opposing teams in their battle before 60,000 or more fans. Although weight advantages gave the easterners an edge in pre-game forecasts, the traditional ability of western players to perform their best heavy odds was not discounted. It was truly a toss-up between the two great combinations.

With linemen like Herm Hickman of Tennessee and Frank Hoffman of Notre Dame and backs of the calibre of Bill Morton of Dartmouth and Gene McEwen of Tennessee, the visiting team boasted power and punch of an unusual quality. Coaches Dick Hanley of Northwestern and Andy Kerr of Colgate, hailed them as the first squad they have brought from the east in years.

Probably few teams could hold out hopes against such an array of stars unless they had the speed and passing ability of such all-westerners as Francis Toscani of St. Mary's, Merle Huijford of Washington, Weldon Mason of Southern Methodist and Ishmael Pilkington of Tulsa. These triple-threat men were counted on by Coaches Dana X. Bible of Nebraska and Percy Loe of the Olympic Club to come through for the west, victors in four of the six previous games.

Some 32 winning teams were represented by the players, who annually are chosen for the inter-sectional game sponsored by San Francisco's Islam Shrine temple for the benefit of the crippled children's hospital.

3 Mile Records Broken By Speed Kings In 1931

New York (AP)—Three of the fastest miles ever negotiated by human beings were recorded during 1931.

Jules Ladoumègue, flying Frenchman, ran a mile in 4:09 1-5 to break the record of Paavo Nurmi by one and one-fifth seconds.

Capt. Malcolm Campbell, British auto speed king, negotiated the same distance at the rate of 245.73 miles an hour at Daytona Beach, Fla. Flight Lieutenant Stainforth of England, in a seaplane, covered a mile faster than any human ever has before. He piloted the plane at the rate of 407.5 miles per hour.

Rain Threatens Engulf Grid Teams As Tulane Meets Trojans In Bowl

Pasadena, Calif., Jan. 1 (AP)—For the nation's football title of the old year, Tulane and Southern California meet this slobber New Year's day on the soggy sod of the historic Rose Bowl to renew the Rose tournament grid classic for the 17th time.

Even with the promise of adverse conditions by the official forecast which read: "Unsettled with probable showers," a record crowd of more than 75,000 persons was expected.

With sure footing improbable, an increasing element of doubt was inserted into the intersectional struggle, but even this failed to dampen the ardor of Trojan enthusiasts who from the first tabbed Coach Howard Jones' powerful players as the favorites.

From the opposing coaches came a depressed note, Bernie Bierman, sending the Green Wave into conflict for the last time, said rainy weather would stop whatever chance his eleven had of depending on passes and speed for a victory.

"I don't see how we can win," he pined, "but we'll show the Trojans we have a football team."
Coach Jones burned the bridges behind his team. "Rainy weather always handicaps any team, but I don't believe we will be bothered any more than Tulane. It should be a great game."

The Greenie Backers, of whom there are some 3,000 including the band and cheer leaders, were far more confident that their coach. These partisans of the bayous of Louisiana fondly expected to see Troy's mighty leave the usually dry Arroyo Seco ankle deep in their own tears.

Troy's weight advantage on the usual basis of reasoning should add to Southern California's chances on a slow field. But this may not be borne out. The famous power thrusts of Gaius Shaver and Orville Mohler are not drives, but quick cut-backs through the line or around the ends which demand sure-footing. Only the hammering of Jimmy "Swete" Musick, fullback.

OLIVER ISELIN, AMERICA'S CUP DEFENDER DIES

Glenhead, N. Y., Jan. 1 (AP)—Charles Oliver Iselin, banker and yachtsman, died at his home here today.

Three of his yachts were defenders of the America's cup, the trophy for which the late Sir Thomas Lipton tried so many times without success to win.

Mr. Iselin's "Vigilant" in 1893 successfully defeating the challenger "Valkyrie II" of Great Britain in three successive races. His "Defender" two years later defeated the "Valkyrie III" of Great Britain, also by three races to none. In that match the British challenger withdrew after the start of the third race on a protest which was not sustained, giving "Defender" the cup.

In 1904 his "Reliance" defeated the "Shamrock III" of Ireland, three races to none.
