

DALLAS FORUM TO MEET TWICE DURING FUTURE

Dallas—The annual meeting of the chamber of commerce was held Wednesday evening in the Presbyterian church with 41 in attendance. Reports covering the past year were given by the secretary, Mrs. C. N. Bilyeu, and the chairman of the various committees.

Mrs. Bilyeu, in her report, recommended that a tax and budget committee should be appointed to look after the affairs of the county and feels sure that the county would reap the benefit of such a committee when the finances come up for the annual consideration of the taxpayers.

Receipts of the chamber were shown to be \$4,103.56 and disbursements \$4,199.86. The difference between the amounts is due to the fact that a number of citizens were subject to the payment of \$165 each as the result of the decision handed down by the supreme court with reference to injunction proceedings toward the construction of the west side highway. The members of the organization felt that it was their duty to contribute their share toward the payment of the money required and as such authorized same, adding the sum of approximately \$1900 to the expenses for the year.

Decision to hold two evening meetings per month was reached and assurance given the Kiwanis club that a number of the activities included in their program would be taken in hand by the various committees of the chamber. Walter S. Murr succeeded himself as president as did Earle Richardson as vice-president. The board of directors shows only two changes, W. L. Soehren and N. L. Guy replacing Drs. V. C. Staats and W. L. Pemberton. Others on the board are J. R. Allgood, M. Dalton, Oscar Hayter, R. E. Krenson, C. H. Sundberg, H. G. Black, C. L. Crider and Eugene Hayter, who will act as treasurer.

J. W. Mott, state corporation commissioner, was the main speaker of the evening. He delivered an instructive and enlightening address on bonding companies and building and loan associations in the state. Fred Dawson of Albany gave an interesting talk on his experiences during a four months' trip in foreign lands.
